BS 5839-6:2004 – What is it?

- Guidance for selection, siting & installation of fire alarm systems for dwellings
- It is considered to be 'Best Practice'
- Building Regulations requirements based on this standard
- NICEIC recommends compliance with this standard for New-Build






Grades & Category

- Grade of system refers to the type of system to be installed
- Category of system refers to the extent of the system - the number of alarms installed






 Grade A and B – similar to commercial type fire alarm systems








 Grade C - A system of fire detectors and alarm sounders (can be smoke alarms), mains powered with a standby supply and central control equipment.







 Grade D - mains smoke/heat alarms with an integral standby supply







- Grade E mains smoke/heat alarms with no standby supply
- Grade F battery powered smoke/heat alarms





Categories of system

- LD3 a system incorporating detectors in all circulation spaces that form part of the escape routes from the dwelling.
- Hallways, Landings
- Open Plan Lounges, Sitting Room





1st floor Landing










Categories of system

- LD2 a system incorporating detectors in all circulation spaces that form part of the escape routes from the dwelling, and in all rooms and areas that present a high fire risk to occupants.
- Same as LD3 plus Living Room & Kitchen (+ Bedrooms in HMO's)

Categories of system

- LD1 a system installed throughout the dwelling, incorporating detectors in all circulation spaces that form part of the escape routes from the dwelling, and in all rooms and areas in which fire may start, other than toilets, bathrooms and shower rooms.
- Alarms everywhere!



Relative frequency of fires

| | Fires | Deaths |
|-------------------------|-------|--------|
| Kitchen | 54% | 15% |
| Bedroom | 12% | 30% |
| Living room/Dining room | 12% | 40% |
| Access Area | 6% | |
| Refuse Area | 3% | |
| Laundry | 1% | |
| Roof space | 1% | |





Fire Safety Guidance

- All existing properties are covered:
- Single households
- Shared houses
- Bedsit HMOs
- Purpose-built flats & buildings converted into self-contained flats to a standard not in compliance with Building Regulations 1991





Fire Safety Guidance

- All tenures are covered:
- Owner-occupied
- Private Rented
- Social Housing
- Does not apply if the property was built or converted in compliance with Building Regulations 1991 or later





Fire Alarm Systems

"There is no risk low enough to negate the need for some form of system"

- Single household up to 4 storey –
 Grade D, LD3
- Shared House HMO up to 4 storey -Grade D, LD3 + Kitchen, Lounge, cellar
- Shared House HMO 5 –6 storey -Grade A, LD2 + all risk rooms





Fire Alarm Systems

- Bedsit HMO up to 2 storey mixed system
 Grade D, LD2 in common areas + heat alarm in bedsits.
 - Grade D alarm in each bedsit
- Bedsit HMO 3 to 6 storey mixed system
 Grade A, LD2 in common areas + heat alarm in bedsits.
 - Grade D alarm in each bedsit





Fire Alarm Systems


- 2 storey house converted to flats, not to Building Regs – mixed system Grade D, LD2 in common areas + heat alarm in entrance to flat Grade D, LD3 in each flat
- 3 6 storey house converted to flats, not to Building Regs – mixed system Grade A, LD2 in common areas + heat alarm in entrance to flat. Grade D, LD3 in each flat



Incorrect siting = SION response




Siting - Single storey






Siting - Single storey






Alarm Siting & Location - Summary


- Ceiling mount in central position
- No recommendations for wall mounting
- Consider false alarm problems e.g too close to bathroom or kitchen
- Max 7.5m from any point in the area
- Site alarm between risk areas (kitchen & lounge) and bedrooms
- Site at least 300mm from walls and obstructions e.g light pendant - where 300mm cannot be achieved site closer to the pendant
- Max 3m from all bedroom doors
- Take account of beams, where necessary



Recommendations for location

First priority for location:


Detector in every room with an appliance.

Limited funds – priorities:

- Flue-less or open-flued appliance.
- 2. Where occupants spend most time.
- 3. Where appliance is most used.


