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Green Space of the Month

The Holt

Located in Lillington to the north of Leamington, The Holt Recreation Ground is a wide, flat open space, ideal for playing sport and hosting community events.

The site is rumoured to have been an old Victorian tip, but we have no evidence to prove this. We do however know that the land was once in the ownership of the Waller family who lived at Woodcote, which is now the Warwickshire Police Headquarters in Leek Wootton. The site was then passed to Thomas Pratt, who is thought to have started Leamington Cricket Club, before it came into the ownership of Leamington Borough Council in 1948. It has remained a public space ever since.

To the far end of the ground is a spinney with vegetation around the boundaries which provides a valuable haven for wild life.

The Holt was redeveloped by the Council's Green Spaces team during 2018. The work involved moving and upgrading the playground, installing outdoor gym equipment and marking out a new football pitch with goals, all of which have proved popular with local residents. At the same time new footpaths were laid which has improved access, particularly from Cubbington Road and Hadrian Close.

The site is used annually for the Lillington Community Fun Days with activities for all ages to enjoy. The next event is on 20th July - visit the Lillington Community Fun Day Facebook page for more information.

Abbey Fields Wildlife Site Designation

We have recently secured 'Local Wildlife Site' designation from Warwickshire County Council for a large part of Abbey Fields, Kenilworth this accreditation has been an ambition of the Green Spaces team for a number of years.

Local Wildlife Sites are areas of land which are of special importance for wildlife, and are identified and selected locally using scientific criteria and ecological surveys. They vary in shape and size and can contain important, distinctive and threatened habitats and species.

Abbey Fields is an important urban reserve with a significant historical past, and contains unusual habitats including sizeable areas of swamp, marshy grassland and hay meadow, in addition to a wide variety of uncommon grassland species such as Greater Tussock-sedge, Meadow Cranesbill, Yellow Rattle and the nationally red-listed Harebell, which is 'near threatened'. A number of rare birds have been spotted in and around the lake including Water Pipit and Grey Phalarope. Kingfishers and Grey Wagtails are regular visitors, and Water Rail also visit and may use the site for breeding. Song Thrushes, Mistle Thrushes and Spotted Flycatcher, which are also nationally red-listed, are seen on the wider site. Abbey Fields encompasses an important wildlife corridor linking the open fields next to the castle with the flood meadows at the back of School Lane, the allotments and Kenilworth Common.

Abbey Fields is accessible to all and gives children a chance to interact with nature and learn about the environment, especially duringz summer months. The grassland meadow areas are uncut in spring and early summer and have a late summer cut for hay. The varied habitats add an important rural character to the local area with stunning views of flower-filled grassland.

This new designation highlights the importance of the site for wildlife, and over the coming months the Green Spaces Team will be working on a management plan with stakeholders to provide a long-term vision for the future management of this stunning open space.
