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Archaeological Desk Based Assessment

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1. NON-TECHNICAL SUMMARY

- 1.1. AOC Archaeology Group was commissioned by the University of Warwick, to provide an archaeological desk-based assessment to support and inform a Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) for the Warwick University Campus Development Framework (hereafter 'the Campus Development Framework) concerning future development of the University of Warwick campus (hereafter 'the Site').
- 1.2. The Site includes the main campus of the University of Warwick, located on the south-western fringe of Coventry, approximately three miles from the City Centre centred at National Grid Reference (NGR) SP 29967 76240 (Figure 1). The Site covers an area of approximately 300 hectares which includes the main University campus buildings and open areas of countryside with lakes, woods and gardens. The Site is comprised of two main areas comprising; a developed block of land in the northeast, and a largely undeveloped block of land in the southeast of the Site. The northwestern area includes a central campus with faculty buildings and Science building. To the north there are residential buildings and sports fields at Westwood and to the east lie further residential buildings and the Medical School at Gibbet Hill. The southeastern area includes sparsely located residential buildings, sports fields, and arable farmland, with the Cryfield Grange Road running through it (aligned east to west).
- 1.3. This assessment has identified the Site contains three Grade II listed buildings, a single Grade II* listed building (Figure 2), 40 non-designated heritage assets (Figure 3), four archaeological constraint areas (Figure 3), eleven archaeological findspots (Figure 5) and 50 archaeological events (Figure 6). These attest to a wide range of evidence for human activity and settlement of the land within the Site from the prehistoric period onwards. The 50 previous archaeological events also demonstrate a legacy of previous archaeological investigations across the Site resulting from the work of Dr Stephen Hill, former University Archaeologist, as well as those prompted by the extensive previous development across the Site.
- 1.4. Any future developments proposals which come forward in line with the SPD will be required to assess the potential for construction works to impact directly or indirectly upon below ground remains. The Site has a long and detailed history of archaeological investigations and much of the Site area has already been subject to some form of archaeological assessment which has demonstrated that archaeological remains survive well in previously undeveloped areas.
- 1.5. This assessment has established that the archaeological potential of the campus varies. A plan showing archaeological potential zones based on the evidence presented in this assessment is included at Figure 14. This plan is necessarily broad but can be used as a basis for mitigation proposals as part of any future development proposals which come forward in line with the SPD. The scope and requirement of any archaeological mitigation should be agreed by the University and be undertaken in consultation with the Local Planning Authority, as advised by the Planning Archaeologists for Coventry and/or Warwickshire.

- 1.6. CIfA (2022) and The Association of Local Government Archaeological Officers (ALGAO) (Mann, 2023) have recently noted the need for public engagement in archaeology. The Levelling-up and Regeneration Act 2023 also notes that where heritage assets are to be impacted a consideration should be given to "enhancing" the asset. Archaeological works undertaken as part of any future planning applications within the Site could offer an opportunity for a programme of public engagement and/or enhancement. Engagement could include opportunities for students and members of the public to visit archaeological excavations within the Site or take part in surveys (if conditions/circumstances allow). The University of Warwick already hosts an excellent website (https://warwick.ac.uk/about/campus/archaeology) which maps and describes some of the main archaeological sites across the campus and provides 3D digital reconstructions. Any works undertaken as part of any future planning applications could be used to further enhance the Site and/or provide links to further information.
- 1.7. It is recommended that consideration should also be given in future development proposals, where relevant, to referencing historic land boundaries in the Site layout and commemoration of the farm, fields, clay pits and station perhaps in the naming of streets, public realm or areas within the new buildings proposed.

2. INTRODUCTION

2.1. Project Background

- 2.1.1. AOC Archaeology Group was commissioned by the University of Warwick, to provide an archaeological desk-based assessment to support and inform a Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) for the Warwick University Campus Development Framework (hereafter 'the Campus Development Framework') concerning future development of the University of Warwick campus (hereafter 'the Site').
- 2.1.2. The Site includes the main campus of the University of Warwick, located on the south-western fringe of Coventry, approximately three miles from the City Centre centred at National Grid Reference (NGR) SP 29967 76240 (Figure 1). The Site covers an area of approximately 300 hectares which includes the main University campus buildings and open areas of countryside with lakes, woods and gardens. The Site is comprised of two main areas comprising; a developed block of land in the northeast, and a largely undeveloped block of land in the southeast of the Site. The northwestern area includes a central campus with faculty buildings and Science building. To the north there are residential buildings and sports fields at Westwood and to the east lie further residential buildings and a medical centre at Gibbet Hill. The southeastern area includes sparsely located residential buildings, sports fields, and arable farmland, with the Cryfield Grange Road running through it (aligned east to west).
- 2.1.3. The Site straddles the boundary of Coventry City Council and Warwick District Council.

2.2. Topographical and Geological Conditions

- 2.2.1. The British Geological Survey GeoIndex (BGS 2023) records a single superficial deposit of alluvium within the Site (clay, silt, sand, and gravel), formed during the Quaternary period and present along the Canley Brook that flows between the central campus and Gibbet Hill Campus in a south westerly direction and includes a smaller subcatchment at Gibbet Hill.
- 2.2.2. The BGS records that the Site sits on two bands of bedrock including the Tile Hill mudstone formation and Kenilworth sandstone formation. The Tile Hill mudstone formation is prevalent throughout the site but varies between argillaceous rock and sandstone, formed between 309.5 and 302 million years ago during the Carboniferous period. This argillaceous and sandstone formation is a red brown mudstone with subordinate thin red brown and green fine to coarse grained sandstone with rare thin conglomeratic lenses. The Kenilworth sandstone formation is located around the south of Site and is predominantly a sandstone formation of red brown with subordinate thin beds of red mudstone, formed between 298.9 and 272.3 million years ago during the Permian period. (BGS 2023).
- 2.2.3. Numerous geotechnical investigations have been undertaken in the developed area within the northwest of the Site (predominantly associated with the University of Warwick). Within the centre of the Site, a borehole (BGS ID:16024704) was sunk to a depth of 40m at the site of the Molecular Science building, now the building of Materials and Analytical Sciences by Foundations Engineering LTD in 1964 (BGS 2023b). This recorded firm light brown sand clay down to depth of 2m, firm yellow clay down to a depth of 7m, firm red clay marl down to a depth of 9m, coarse red medium hard sandstone with some grey bands and thin layers of red clay marl down to a depth of 40m. Another borehole within the northern area of Site (BGS ID: 18164622) was sunk to a depth of 4.18m at the site of the Westwood Teaching and Westwood Lecture Theatre by IGES Ltd in 2005 (BGS 2023c). This recorded firm dark brown mottled orange brown slightly sand gravel clay with occasional charcoal fragments down to a depth of 0.3m, made ground of fine to course red brick down to a depth of 0.5m, made ground of black fine to

medium gravel of asphalt down to a depth of 0.65m, orange brown mottled grey sand with brown patches (Tile Hill mudstone formation) down to a depth of 0.95m, very dense grey sand (Tile Hill mudstone formation) down to a depth of 1.55m, hard red brown clay with occasional grey reduction spots (Tile Hill mudstone formation) down to a depth of 4.18m. Another borehole just outside the red line boundary to the southeast of Site (BGS ID: 325792) was sunk to a depth of 2.9m at land adjacent to Manderley Cryfield Grange by IGES Ltd in 1998 (BGS 2023d). This recorded topsoil down to a depth of 0.15m, red brown silt clay fine to medium sand with occasional quartz gravel, sandstone gravel and clay pockets down to a depth of 0.65m, red brown silt sand with some to much sandstone gravel down to a depth of 1.2m, stiff red brown silt clay with mudstone down to a depth of 2.8m, red brown fine grained thin bedded, closely jointed mudstone down to a depth of 2.9m.

- 2.2.4. Archaeological watching brief of geotechnical works undertaken in 2016 in advance of the Sports and Wellness Hub and associated grounds located within the southwestern area of the Site revealed the area to be overlain by Tile Hill mudstone formation and Kenilworth sandstone formation. The geotechnical works recorded sandstone at a depth of 1.8m, mudstone at a depth of 3.2m, sandstone and mudstone at a depth of 2m, sand at a depth of 1.6m, and gravel at a depth of 2m (Cotswold 2016a/Event 138).
- 2.2.5. Archaeological evaluation works of the same area undertaken in 2016 revealed the southwestern part of the Site to be underlain by superficial deposits of mid red brown sand clay to clay sand matric (thought to be subsoil during the preceding watching brief that year). These natural deposits were encountered at a height of c.0.46m below present ground level (BPGL). The general topography of the area evaluated was described 90m AOD within its southeast corner, from which it slopes downward to approximately 82 and 80m AOD in its northern and western corners (Cotswold 2016b/Event 139).
- 2.2.6. The results of previous geotechnical and archaeological investigation therefore indicate that topsoil or made ground within the Site is likely to be underlain by superficial clay and sand deposits, in addition to alluvium along the Canley Brook recorded by the BGS. There is consequently judged to be limited potential for peat and alluvial deposits of geoarchaeological and paleoenvironmental interest within the Site.

2.3. The Supplementary Planning Development (SPD) Proposals

- 2.3.1. The Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) has been prepared by City and District Councils in conjunction with the University of Warwick to give effect to their local plan policies which guide how the campus should develop. As such, it is not a masterplan but a development framework setting out a series of capital projects likely to be delivered by 2033 within the context of a longer-term vision to 2050 (Turley & BDP 2024). This assessment is focussed on the 2033 Campus Development Framework proposals which will form part of the wider SPD to be submitted to Warwickshire County and Coventry City Councils at the start of 2024. Brief consideration is also given to the 2050 Vision. The Proposed Development Zones for both the 2033 Campus Development Framework and 2050 Vision are described and shown in greater detail in the SPD Report (Turley & BDP 2024).
- 2.3.2. The SPD identifies projects to be delivered over the next ten years to 2033. This includes the proposed Science and Engineering Precinct and the Social Sciences Quarter together with solar PV farms. Taking into account the committed and proposed projects, a capacity of 13,000 sqm floorspace is identified to allow for other projects to come forward in the period to 2033 (Turley & BDP 2024).

2.4. Government and Local Planning Policies and Guidance

Legislative Framework

2.4.1. Parliamentary legislation for listed buildings is provided by the Planning (Listed Building and Conservation Areas)

Act 1990 and legislation for scheduled monuments is provided by the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological

Areas Act 1979. The most recent legislation, the Levelling Up and Regeneration Act 2023, includes provision for designated heritage assets including scheduled monuments, registered parks and gardens as well as placing a statutory duty on local planning authorities to maintain Historic Environment Records (HERs).

National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF)

- 2.4.2. The revised National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) was last updated in December 2023. The NPPF sets out the Government's planning policies for England and how these should be applied. It provides a framework within which locally prepared plans for development can be produced and assessed. Chapter 16 of the NPPF is concerned with 'conserving and enhancing the historic environment'. It identifies heritage assets as 'an irreplaceable resource' and notes that they 'should be conserved in a manner appropriate to their significance, so that they can be enjoyed for their contribution to the quality of life of existing and future generations' (DLUHC 2023, para 195).
- 2.4.3. Where designated assets are concerned great weight should be given to the asset's conservation. The more important the asset the greater the weight should be. Any harm to or loss of significance that is predicted to result from either a direct impact upon a designated heritage asset or a change to its setting should require 'clear and convincing justification. Substantial harm to or loss of:
 - 'grade II listed buildings, or grade II registered parks or gardens, should be exceptional.'
 - 'assets of the highest significance, notably scheduled monuments, protected wreck sites, registered battlefields, grade I and II* listed buildings, grade I and II* registered parks and gardens, and world heritage sites, should be wholly exceptional' (DLUHC 2023, Para 206).
- 2.4.4. Impacts upon non-designated heritage assets are also a pertinent planning consideration; Paragraph 209 states that 'In weighing applications that directly or indirectly affect non-designated heritage assets, a balanced judgement will be required having regard to the scale of any harm or loss and the significance of the heritage asset.'

 (DLUHC 2023, Para 209)
- 2.4.5. Where a heritage asset is to be lost, either in part or in whole, as a result of the development, the local planning authority should require developers to 'record and advance understanding of the significance of any heritage assets to be lost (wholly or in part) in a manner proportionate to their importance and the impact, and to make this evidence (and any archive generated) publicly accessible.' (DLUHC 2023, Para 211).

Planning Practice Guidance

- 2.4.6. Planning practice guidance (PPG) was published in November 2016 and is updated periodically, though the section on the Historic Environment was last updated on the 23rd of July 2019, to expand upon the NPPF. Section 18a of the guidance is concerned with '…enhancing and conserving the historic environment'. The Guidance notes that 'conservation is an active process of maintenance and managing change. It requires a flexible and thoughtful approach to get the best out of assets as diverse as listed buildings in everyday use and as yet undiscovered, undesignated buried remains of archaeological interest.'
 - 'Paragraph: 002 Reference ID: 18a-002-20190723'. (MHCLG, 2019)
- 2.4.7. When considering whether a proposal would cause substantial harm to a designated asset the PPG observes that:
 'Substantial harm is a high test, so it may not arise in many cases. For example, in determining whether works to a listed building constitute substantial harm, an important consideration would be whether the adverse impact seriously affects a key element of its special architectural or historic interest. It is the degree of harm to the asset's significance rather than the scale of the development that is to be assessed. The harm may arise from works to the asset or from development within its setting. While the impact of total destruction is obvious, partial destruction is

likely to have a considerable impact but, depending on the circumstances, it may still be less than substantial harm or conceivably not harmful at all, for example, when removing later additions to historic buildings where those additions are inappropriate and harm the buildings' significance. Similarly, works that are moderate or minor in scale are likely to cause less than substantial harm or no harm at all. However, even minor works have the potential to cause substantial harm, depending on the nature of their impact on the asset and its setting'.

'Paragraph: 018 Reference ID: 18a-018-20190723' (MHCLG, 2019)

2.4.8. PPG (2019, Para 18) requires assessments to consider the potential for harm to heritage assets to result from impacts arising from any future developments outlined in the SPD in order to understand the impact on the significance of the heritage asset. Where designated heritage assets will be impacted upon, the PPG requires the assessment to clearly state whether that harm will be substantial or less than substantial.

Local Planning Policy

- 2.4.9. The Site straddles the boundary of Coventry City Council and Warwick District Council; therefore this assessment considers the Local Planning Policies of both administrative areas as both plans will guide the area's development.
- 2.4.10. The section of the Coventry Local Plan 2011-2031 (Adopted December 2017) relating to the conservation and enhancement of the historic environment contains the following policies that are relevant to this assessment.

'Policy HE2: Conservation and Heritage Assets

- 1. In order to help sustain the historic character, sense of place, environmental quality and local distinctiveness of Coventry, development proposals will be supported where they conserve and, where appropriate, enhance those aspects of the historic environment which are recognised as being of special historic, archaeological, architectural, artistic, landscape or townscape significance. These Heritage Assets include:
 - a. Listed Buildings and Locally Listed buildings;
 - b. Conservation Areas;
 - c. Scheduled Ancient Monuments and Archaeological sites;
 - d. Registered Parks and Gardens; and
 - e. Other places, spaces, structures and features which may not be formally designated but are recognised as significant elements of Coventry's heritage and are positively identified on the Coventry Historic Environment Record.
- 2. Proposals likely to affect the significance of a heritage asset or its setting should demonstrate an understanding of such significance using currently available evidence.
- 3. Development proposals involving heritage assets in general and listed buildings in particular, should acknowledge the significance of the existing building and the area by means of their siting, massing, form, scale, materials and detail.
- 4. The sympathetic and creative re-use of heritage assets will be encouraged, especially for heritage that is considered to be at risk, so long as it is not damaging to the significance of the heritage asset. The embodied energy present in historic buildings contributes to sustainability.
- 5. The Council will use its statutory powers to secure the preservation of buildings and other heritage assets that are deemed to be at risk by the national and local heritage at risk registers.
- 6. Demolition or destruction of heritage assets will be resisted; proposals to demolish a heritage asset will therefore

need substantial justification. The greater the damage to the significance of the asset, the greater the justification required and the public benefit needed to outweigh such damage.

- 7. All proposals should aim to sustain and reinforce the special character and conserve the following distinctive historic elements of Coventry:
 - a. The surviving buildings, defences and street plan of the medieval city centre and its suburbs;
 - b. The surviving pre-industrial settlements and landscape features which have been subsumed by the expansion of the city such as Walsgrave, Canley, Binley, Brownshill Green, Coundon Green, Little Heath (Spring Road), Stivichall Croft and Lower Eastern Green (at Dial House Lane);
 - c. The wider Arden rural environment on the fringe of the city comprising field-systems, ancient woodlands and commons which developed over centuries; interspersed with a mix of settlements, farmsteads and smallholdings;
 - d. Buildings associated with the city's industrial heritage; ribbon weaving, watch making, cycle making, motor car manufacturing, brick making, coal mining, synthetic textiles, munitions, aeronautical engineering, canals and railways;
 - e. The Victorian and Edwardian suburbs such as Earlsdon and Stoke;
 - f. Designed landscapes, including historic parks and gardens (both registered and locally listed), historic cemeteries, churchyards and public parks; 102
 - g. The significant elements of Coventry's ground-breaking post-war reconstruction including its plan, built form, public art works and public spaces; and
 - h. Archaeological remains of all periods from the earliest Prehistoric human habitation to the modern industrial period.
- 8. Where material change to a heritage asset has been agreed, recording and interpretation should be undertaken to document and understand the asset's archaeological, architectural or historic significance. The scope of the recording should be proportionate to the asset's significance and the impact of the development on the asset. The information and understanding gained should be made publicly available, as a minimum through the Coventry Historic Environment Record.'
- 2.4.11. The section of the Warwick Local Plan 2011-2029 (adopted September 2017) relating to the conservation and enhancement of the historic environment contains the following policies that are relevant to this assessment.

HE4 Archaeology

Development will not be permitted that results in substantial harm to Scheduled Monuments or other archaeological remains of national importance, and their settings unless in wholly exceptional circumstances.

There will be a presumption in favour of the preservation of locally and regionally important sites, except where the applicant can demonstrate that the benefits of development will outweigh the harm to archaeological remains.

The Council will require that any remains of archaeological value are properly evaluated prior to the determination of the planning application.

Where planning permission is granted for development which will have an adverse effect on archaeological remains, the Council will require that an agreed programme of archaeological investigation and recording precedes

development.

2.5. Planning Considerations

- 2.5.1. The Site straddles the boundary of Coventry City Council (CCC) and Warwick District Council (WDC) therefore planning decisions rest with both authorities. The local planning authorities are advised on archaeological matters by the Coventry City Council (CCC) and Warwickshire County Council (WCC) planning archaeologists. Any requirement for archaeological work either preceding or during development would be determined by the planning archaeologist with responsibility for the area of the Site within which the specific element of the Campus Development framework is located. Where a proposed development element straddles the two authority areas both planning archaeologists would be consulted.
- 2.5.2. This assessment has utilised a 1km Study Area for the identification of all known heritage assets and previous archaeological interventions to help identify the potential for direct impacts upon known heritage assets and to predict whether any similar hitherto unknown archaeological remains are likely to survive within the Site and thus be impacted by the Campus Development Framework proposals.
- 2.5.3. The National Heritage List for England (NHLE) identifies four listed building assets within the Site (Figure 2), including the Grade II* listed modern Houses for Visiting Mathematicians, located near the Medical School at Gibbet Hill (Asset 91), the Grade II listed modern sculpture located near the International House in the centre east of the Site (Asset 92), and the Grade II listed post-medieval Cryfield House Farmhouse located along the Leighfield Road in the centre of the Site (Asset 276). The Grade II listed post-medieval Cryfield Grange Farmhouse is not within the Site (Asset 274), however the listed building lies within a non-designated area which extends into the Site boundary. The lands of the Site were part of the wider Cryfield Grange Farm from the medieval period (Asset 185) and therefore this assessment will also consider Cryfield Grange Farm as within the Site boundary where relevant.
- 2.5.4. There are 40 non-designated heritage assets within the Site including features recorded from the HER files and historic mapping (Assets 13-14, 19, 21-22, 25-27, 36, 39, 50-51, 54-55, 162, 179-181, 185-187, 189, 195-197, 202-207, 219, 224-225, 279-283, 286, Figure 3), four non-designated heritage assets included as archaeological constraint areas (64-65, 72, 80, Figure 3) and eleven non-designated heritage assets included as archaeological findspots (Assets 15, 20, 141-143, 145, 149, 167, 169, 277-278, Figure 5).
- 2.5.5. Records relating to previous archaeological investigations have been recorded as events within the Site, where a total of 50 events have been identified (Events 98, 100-106, 112-120, 122, 123, 127, 130-132, 134, 138-139, 236-237, 239-242, 244-254, 247-254, 256, 263, 266, 268, 270-271, 284, 285, Figure 6).
- 2.5.6. Coventry City Council have designated two Conservation Areas, located within the 1km Study Area. These are the post-medieval Kenilworth Road Conservation Area and the post-medieval Ivy Farm Lane Conservation Area (Assets 95 & 96, Figure 2). The Kenilworth Road Conservation Area clips the red line boundary of the Site (Asset 95).
- 2.5.7. There are ten Grade II listed buildings within the 1km Study Area (Figure 2), including the post-medieval Church of St John the Baptist (Asset 82) and a post medieval barn named the Moat House, now converted into two cottages (Asset 85). There are also several post-medieval buildings, now used as residential dwellings, located along the Ivy Farm Lane at Canley, including the Grade II listed Ivy Farmhouse with converted Grade II listed Barn and Grade II listed Stables (Assets 83, 86 & 88), while there are two separately located Grade II listed Canley Hall Farmhouses of the same name in the same area (Assets 84 & 87). In addition, there is a modern Grade II listed house along Kenilworth Road (Asset 89), a modern Grade II listed house along Cryfield Grange Road (Asset 90) and a post-medieval cottage in South Hurst (Asset 275).
- 2.5.8. In addition to the aforementioned listed buildings within the 1km Study Area (Figure 2) there are two locally listed

buildings; the post-medieval Canley Hall Farm cottages, located along Ivy Farm Lane, c.550m northeast of the Site and the modern Network Rail College, located along the Westwood Heath Road c1.15km west of the Site (Assets 93-94). Two scheduled monuments are also identified within 1km of the Site and comprise two separately located medieval moated sites at Bishop Ullathorne School and at Bockenden Grange (Assets 81 & 277).

- 2.5.9. The Coventry and Warwickshire Historic Environment Records (HER) have also identified a large number of non-designated heritage assets within the 1km Study Area, including 78 recorded as features taken from the HER files and historic mapping (Assets 1-4, 8-12, 18, 23-24, 28-35, 37-38, 40-42, 44-48, 52-53, 56-58, 140, 154, 161,163, 165, 170-172, 174-178, 182-184, 188, 190-194, 198-201, 209-211, 218, 220-223, 226-234, Figure 4). There are also 18 archaeological constraint areas (Asset 59-63, 66-71, 73-79, Figure 4), and 22 findspots (Assets 5-7, 17, 144, 146-148, 150-153, 155-160, 164, 166, 168, 208, Figure 5).
- 2.5.10. Records relating to previous archaeological investigations have been recorded as events within the Site and 1km Study Area of the Site, where a total of 84 events have been identified (Events 97-139, 235-273, 284-285, Figure 6).
- 2.5.11. Non-designated landscape assets have also been recorded by the Warwickshire HER where a total of 865 have been identified within the Site and 1km of the Site and included on a table in Appendix 3.
- 2.5.12. There are no world heritage sites, registered parks and gardens, registered battlefields identified within the Site or the surrounding 1km Study Area.

2.6. Limitations of Scope

- 2.6.1. This assessment is based upon data obtained from publicly accessible archives as described in the *Data Sources* in Section 4.3. All known heritage assets within 1km of the Site were identified. Historic Environment Record (HER) data from Coventry HER was obtained on 14th December 2023 and HER data from Warwickshire HER was received on 22nd December 2023 with information on designated assets downloaded from the National Heritage List for England (NHLE). The information presented in the asset and event gazetteer (Appendix 2) regarding known heritage assets and events is current to these dates.
- 2.6.2. This assessment is focused on the potential for known and unknown archaeological remains to be impacted by future development within the Site. Consideration of potential impacts upon the setting of heritage assets and impact on the wider historic landscape character have been considered elsewhere as part of the SPD process.
- 2.6.3. It should be noted that this report has been prepared under the instructions and solely for the use of The University of Warwick and their partners. All the work carried out in this report is based upon AOC Archaeology Group's professional knowledge and understanding of current (February 2024) and relevant United Kingdom standards and codes, technology, and legislation.
- 2.6.4. Changes in these areas may occur in the future and cause changes to the conclusions, advice or recommendations given. AOC Archaeology Group does not accept responsibility for advising The University of Warwick or associated parties of the facts or implications of any such changes in the future.
- 2.6.5. Online searches were conducted in December 2023 using online sources highlighted in the *Data Sources* in section 4.3.

3. OBJECTIVES

3.1 The main objective of this assessment is to identify the potential for archaeological remains assets to be impacted by future development within the SPD boundary. The evidence presented and the conclusions offered will provide

a comprehensive basis for further discussion and for the formulation of guidance within the SPD and a mitigation strategy for future development proposals, should this be required. This will be done, by examining a variety of evidence for upstanding and buried remains of heritage interest including designated and non-designated heritage assets within 1km of the Site. The assessment is based upon data obtained from publicly accessible archives as described in Data Sources in Section 4.3.

4. METHODOLOGY

4.1. Standards

- 4.1.1. The scope of this assessment meets the requirements of current planning regulations set out in Planning Practice Guidance (PPG) (2016, updated November 2023, Historic Environment section published 2014, updated July 2019); National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) (December 2023); Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act, 1990; and local planning policy.
- 4.1.2. AOC Archaeology Group conforms to the standards of professional conduct outlined in the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists' (CIfA) Code of Conduct (CIfA 2019, updated 2022), and Regulations for Professional Conduct (2019, updated 2021), the CIfA Standard and Guidance for Historic Environment Desk Based Assessment (CIfA 2014, updated 2020), and the CIfA Standard and guidance for commissioning work on, or providing consultancy advice on, archaeology and the historic environment' (CIfA 2014, updated 2020), and other relevant guidance.
- 4.1.3. AOC Archaeology Group is a Registered Organisation of the ClfA. This status ensures that there is regular monitoring and approval by external peers of our internal systems, standards and skills development.
- 4.1.4. AOC is ISO 9001:2015 accredited, in recognition of the company's quality management system.

4.2. Assessment Criteria

- 4.2.1. The assessment aims to identify the known and likely archaeological potential of the Site and the relative value or importance of such a resource / asset. The criteria for assessing these factors are laid out in detail in Appendix 1.
- 4.2.2. The criteria for assessing archaeological potential are expressed in this report as ranging between the scales of High, Medium, Low and Uncertain, criteria for which are also noted in Appendix 1.
- 4.2.3. Levels of importance in the report are expressed as ranging between the scales of High, Medium, Low, Negligible and Unknown. The importance of heritage assets is determined firstly by reference to existing designations for example scheduled monuments are already classified as nationally important and therefore of High importance. For assets where no designation has previously been assigned, the likely importance of that resource has been based upon the available evidence and professional knowledge and judgement.
- 4.2.4. The likely magnitude of the impact of the Proposed Development works is determined by identifying the degree of change from the Proposed Development upon the 'baseline' conditions of the Site and the heritage resource identified in the assessment. This impact can be either adverse (negative), beneficial (positive) or Neutral and is ranked according to the scale of High, Medium, Low, Negligible or Neutral.

Assessment of Direct Impacts

4.2.5. The assessment of Direct Impacts will be undertaken in line with the assessment criteria noted above and in Appendix 1. This will be done by establishing the historic environment baseline through examination of the data sources outlined in Section 4.3 and a walkover survey. Any future development as outlined in the SPD will be assessed against the established historic environment baseline, and potential direct impacts on known and

unknown heritage assets will be identified.

 Collection of Aerial Photography (CUCAP) and Historic England (Swindon) for:
 - Aerial photographs.
 - Environment Agency, National Lidar Programme for:
 - LiDAR data covering the Site.
 - University of Warwick Archive, Modern Records Centre for:
 - \circ Historic maps and plans and archaeological reports and plans relating to the Site
 - Herbert Museum, Coventry;
 - Online catalogue of historic maps and archaeological reports and plans relating to the site (note that the Herbert Museum is currently closed for stocktaking, but relevant records were found to be duplicated either in the Modern Records Centre or Warwickshire County Record Office)
 - Shakespeare Centre Library and Archive;
 - Historic maps and plans relating to land within the Site.
 - Warwickshire County Record Office for:
 - Historic maps, plans and documents relating to land within the Site.
 - Published and unpublished sources listed in Section 7.

4.4 Report Structure

4.4.1. Each heritage asset, archaeological constraints area and findspots referred to as an 'asset') and each previous archaeological investigation (referred to as an 'event') referred to in the text is listed in the Gazetteer in Appendix2. Each has been assigned an 'Asset/Event No.' unique to this assessment, and the Gazetteer includes information

- regarding the type, period, grid reference, NRHE number, HER number, protective designation, and other descriptive information, as derived from the consulted sources.
- 4.4.2. Each heritage asset and event referred to in the text is plotted on Figures 3, 4, 5 and 6 at the end of the report, using the assigned asset/event numbers with the Site outlined in red and Study Areas outlined in blue and black.
- 4.4.3. All sources consulted during the assessment, including publications, archived records, photographic and cartographic evidence, are listed amongst the *References* in Section 7.

5. ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND HISTORICAL EVIDENCE

5.1. Undated evidence

- 5.1.1. The site of a possible non-designated fishpond (Asset 204), used for the breeding and storage of fish, is located to the northwest of the Grade II listed Cryfield House Farmhouse (Asset 276). It may also have been used as a marl pit. Although presently undated, the fishpond is likely to date to the medieval or post-medieval periods.
- 5.1.2. An undated roughly northwest–southeast aligned non-designated cropmarked feature (Asset 205) has been identified to the northeast of the post-medieval Grade II listed Cryfield House Farmhouse (Asset 276). It is possible that this cropmarked feature forms part of an enclosure. Although presently undated, this feature could be prehistoric or Roman as prehistoric and Roman finds were recovered from this and the adjoining field during fieldwalking undertaken in 1996 (Assets 145, 167, 169. Events 242, 248).
- 5.1.3. Non-designated undated cropmarked features (Asset 195) have been identified c.300m south of the Grade II listed Cryfield House Farmhouse (Asset 207) via aerial photography where two parallel linear features may have defined a trackway or a bank, but this remains unconfirmed as the land has been levelled for sports fields. Further undated cropmarked features are present in the southeast of the Site where aerial photography from 1965 supported by geophysical survey undertaken in 2013 identified linear features of unknown date (Asset 189, Event 263). These features could range from the prehistoric to the medieval period, if associated with the non-designated prehistoric flint artefact (Asset 143), Mesolithic flint scatter (Asset 159), Roman coins (Asset 164) and medieval pottery sherds (Asset 152) recovered from fieldwalking undertaken in 1996 of the surrounding fields to the west (Event 246, 247). The close proximity of the non-designated Milburn deserted medieval settlement c.200m south of the cropmarked features should also be considered and may indicate a medieval date for the features (Asset 191, Event 259).
- 5.1.4. A resistivity survey undertaken in 1996 of land northeast of Cryfield House Farm, identified a non-designated possible archaeological anomaly of unknown date and form (Asset 197, Event 226), however subsequent fieldwork revealed medieval features were present within the area (Asset 224, Events 266, 268).
- 5.1.5. Undated remains have been recorded on undeveloped land located on the corner of Kirby Corner Road and Gibbet Hill Road where a geophysical survey recorded anomalies of undetermined origin and while these are likely to be agricultural and/or modern in origin, an archaeological origin cannot be completely ruled out (Asset 286, Event 285, Magnitude Surveys 2023).

5.2. Prehistoric (pre- AD 43)

- 5.2.1. Palaeolithic, Mesolithic and Neolithic artefacts have been discovered on campus, indicating human activity in the early prehistoric period (Rupp 2007). However, there is no direct evidence for human occupation within the Site or indeed within the Coventry City boundary during the Palaeolithic period as finds of flints of Palaeolithic date have been found in surface deposits of drift geology and therefore provide no context (Coventry City Council 2013).
- 5.2.2. The Mesolithic period has been little studied in the West Midlands (Garwood 2011, 25) and finds densities are

relatively low in comparison with other parts of Britain. While finds of likely Mesolithic date have been located within the Site as a result of systematic fieldwork most Mesolithic material in the wider area derives from unsystematic surface collection. Finds within the centre of the Site include a scatter of non-designated prehistoric flintwork recorded in 'Field C2' during archaeological fieldwalking in advance of development to the east of Scarman Road (Asset 142, Event 241), while another non-designated flint scatter comprising a total of 54 flint objects of Mesolithic and Neolithic date was recorded in 'Field C6' in the same area (Asset 145, Event 242). Further south of Site, three flint artefacts of Palaeolithic and Mesolithic date were recorded in 'Field D3', 200m southeast of Roughknowles Wood (Asset 141, Event 244) along with 18 flint artefacts of Neolithic to Bronze Age date which were recorded in 'Field D4' (Asset 149, Event 245) and an unworked but imported flint object of potential prehistoric date found in 'Field D11' (Asset 143, Event 247). The recover of flints of Mesolihic date where systematic surface collection has occurred indicates that there may be potential for recovery of further artefact assemblages within the Site.

- 5.2.3. An archaeological evaluation in 1997 within the vicinity of the post-medieval Grade II listed Cryfield House Farm recorded a scatter of finds of Mesolithic or Neolithic date associated with undated features, mainly possible post-holes, identified during the fieldwork (Asset 145, Event 242, Smith and Wilson 1997).
- 5.2.4. Neolithic sites in the region are unevenly but sparsely distributed, finds densities are low in comparison with other regions and evidence is often represented by pits and surface scatters of lithic artefacts (Garwood 2011, 34 and 38). A non-designated Neolithic hand axe (Asset 20) was found at the north end of the campus near Sma' Lane while another non-designated Neolithic axe was found within the 1km Study Area, c1.22km southeast of Gibbet Hill (Asset 150).
- 5.2.5. While there is limited evidence for Bronze Age settlement in the wider Warwickshire area (Palmer 2002), excavations prior to the construction of the Sports Pavilion uncovered post-holes in a concentric circular arrangement typical of a Bronze Age roundhouse about six metres in diameter with a thatched roof extending beyond the main wall of the building and supported on an outer circle of small posts. An associated rubbish pit contained the remains of a pregnant cow and butchered fox bones (Asset 196, Event 237, Warwick University 2014b).
- 5.2.6. A raised earthen mound (Asset 203) in the centre of the Site is possibly a Bronze Age barrow although this is based upon its form and location and no dating evidence exists to confirm this hypothesis.
- 5.2.7. The remains of an extensive Iron Age settlement (Westwood Iron Age Settlement) are located within the Site in the vicinity of University House and represents the earliest evidence for occupation so far proven in Coventry (Asset 21, 39, 219, Soden 2005, 16). The settlement was found to be defended by a substantial ditch and rampart (Asset 21) and is now included within an archaeological constraint area for the settlement (Asset 72). A section of the defensive ditch of the Iron Age settlement survives in the north of the Site where it runs from the road between the gatehouse (Community Safety Hub building) and the Boiler house, towards the Engineering building (Plate 11). Gibbet Hill Road represents a possible continuation of the prehistoric Hollow Way, which runs from the Westwood Iron Age Settlement (University of Warwick 2014f).
- 5.2.8. Part of the Iron Age settlement was excavated by Dr Stephen Hill in 2002 where parts of the defensive ditch and rampart were uncovered alongside the construction slots of at least 14 round houses together with several simple four-post structures which would have served as animal sheds (Assets 39/72/219, Event 240, 103, Hill 2002). The round houses were up to 18 metres in diameter and had wattle and daub (mud on hurdle) walls and thick thatched roofs. Votive materials (horses' heads and pottery vessels) were placed in the round house construction trenches when the round houses were built. The round houses had entrances with porches on their east side away from the

prevailing winds where some of the buildings were used for industrial purposes and contained small pottery crucibles for smelting metal. Aerial photographs show a banjo-shaped enclosure on the north side of the Iron Age site, now underlying the running track (Asset 22) and placed within an archaeological constraint area (Asset 64). This structure may represent the earliest phase of the settlement as excavated structures were arranged in overlapping groups, demonstrating that there were at least three phases of occupation. The implication of this, given the cost and effort involved in constructing buildings from vast quantities of oak, reed and clay, is that the site may have been occupied for a long period in later prehistory (Hill 2002).

- 5.2.9. Prehistoric remains were recorded in 2014 prior to the construction of the National Automotive Innovation Centre. Archaeological fieldwork recovered a single prehistoric flint tool in the topsoil and was subsequently retained due to Iron Age activity in the surrounding landscape (Asset 15, Event 127). Iron Age remains were also recorded further south of this where fieldwork undertaken in 2006, prior to the construction of the International Digital Laboratory building, uncovered a former watercourse (Asset 54) of the present-day stream along with a separate ditch of similar alignment (Asset 55, Event 120).
- 5.2.10. Within Tocil Wood, close to the Gibbet Hill Road and outside the Site boundary, is the site of a small rectilinear Iron Age enclosure (Asset 41, 56-58, Plate 15) which is placed within an archaeological constraint area (Asset 68). Excavation of the enclosure revealed fragments of Roman pottery from the early 1st century AD, buried by the collapse of the rampart, along with examples of local Iron Age pottery (Event 97). Pollen analysis of samples from the buried topsoil hidden by the construction of the rampart indicated that the Iron Age settlement was constructed within deciduous woodland containing oak as the dominant species, with hazel undergrowth. Holly, maple and sycamore pollen were absent from the record, being respectively Roman, medieval and post-medieval introductions to the region. The excavation demonstrated three phases of revetting to the front of the rampart dating the Iron Age settlement in Tocil Wood to a period extending from the late 1st century BC into the 1st century AD, up to the Roman occupation of the Midlands from about AD 60 (Asset 196, Event 97).
- 5.2.11. Given the survival of both upstanding and buried prehistoric remains within the Site, the potential for previously unrecorded prehistoric remains to survive on the Site beyond the footprints of modern University buildings is considered to be Medium to High.

5.3. Roman (AD 43 to AD 410)

- 5.3.1. Mosaic fragments and pottery of Roman date were located during fieldwalking of a field northeast of the post-medieval Grade II listed Farmhouse at Cryfield House Farm with more found in the same field in 2013 (Asset 167, Event 242) while another field northwest of Cryfield House Farm contained further mosaic fragments (Asset 169, Event 248). Most of the mosaic fragments were noted to be individual tessera, but some larger elements of tessellated pavement were also recovered and could suggest the location of a Roman villa or rural shrine in the wider vicinity.
- 5.3.2. During the construction of the modern lake to the northeast of Tocil Wood, sherds from Roman mortaria and a fragment of a quernstone for milling flour were salvaged (Asset 277) while similar loose Roman finds (Asset 278) were retrieved during the construction of the Jack Martin residences to the north of the lake (University of Warwick, 2014e).
- 5.3.3. Based on the limited evidence for Roman activity within the Site, there is judged to be a Low potential for Roman

remains to survive within the Site.

5.4. Early medieval and medieval (AD 410 – 1540)

- 5.4.1. The Site is located within the historic parish of Stoneleigh, to the west and south of Coventry which has absorbed much of the parish over the last century (VCH 1951, 229). Stoneleigh was 'ancient demesne land' having been held before the Conquest by Edward the Confessor (VCH 1951, 233). At Domesday it was rated at six hides. The Domesday survey gives a total of 68 villeins and four borders however the former term was probably used only loosely, since by the mid-12th century there were a number of sokemen, each holding a virgate of 30 acres at the King's two manors of Stoneleigh and Cryfield. A mill was also to be recorded in operation at Cryfield, which was worth '5s' (Asset 180, Event 256, Powell- Smith, 2023).
- 5.4.2. The placename of Cryfield also provides some indication that the settlement has medieval origins; with the name being recorded as 'Croilesfelda' in 1154 and 'Crulefeld' in 1262. The first element of the name probably derives from the word 'Creowel', derived from Old English words for a fork and may reference the forking valleys at this location, hence a meaning of 'open land by the fork' (University of Nottingham, 2023).
- 5.4.3. In the medieval period the land in the south of the Site, including land associated with the non-designated post-medieval Cryfield House Farm (Asset 207) and the lands around the non-designated medieval Grange (Asset 185), was in the possession of Stoneleigh Abbey (a Cistercian house). Stoneleigh Abbey was initially known as the Abbey of Radmore, founded in the reign of King Stephen (c. 1092–1154) where a royal grant in the 12th century allowed the construction of a monastery at Cryfield on land that had formed part of the royal hunting estate at Stoneleigh. Shortly after its foundation the monks are reported to have moved their monastic buildings away from Cryfield to Stoneleigh, claiming that the site at Cryfield was too disturbed (Spendlove 1999).
- 5.4.4. Traces of the central monastic buildings, including its church and cloister, have yet to be discovered, however the non-designated post-medieval Cryfield House Farm (Asset 207) and the Grade II listed Cryfield Grange Farmhouse (Asset 274) are two possible locations. The presence of an un-degraded pebble floor of a kind not uncommon in medieval buildings and a substantial, well-made sandstone wall were discovered during the conversion of a post-medieval barn (now known as Oak Tree Cottage) near to Grade II listed Cryfield Grange Farmhouse (Asset 274). While the Barker map of 1766 (Figure 8) shows a building on the site quite different in shape to that of the 19th century barn, the 1996 investigations appear to have exposed the remains of an earlier floor beneath this structure which may be of medieval date (Asset 179, Event 270, Wilson 2009). The presence of 12th century pottery and substantial sandstone structures at the non-designated post-medieval Cryfield House Farm (Asset 207) suggest an alternative possible location for the monastic building (Asset 206). The sandstone features, which could also be of 17th century or 18th century date, include the footings of the present post-medieval Grade II listed farmhouse (Asset 276), a sandstone lined well, a pavement of cut blocks and a massive wall buried in the back garden. It is likely that most of the stone for these features was also quarried fairly close to the Site.
- 5.4.5. Medieval remains have also been recovered on land northeast of Cryfield House Farm (Asset 207) where two phases of fieldwork undertaken in 2017 and 2018 recorded a group of five medieval pits containing medieval pottery (Asset 224, Events 266, 268). One of the pits had been identified as Roman during the first phase of fieldwork however the pottery recovered from the pit was reassessed during the second phase of fieldwork where the site was reinterpreted as medieval.
- 5.4.6. A Leger Book dating to the 14th century and compiled by Thomas Pype, Abbot of Stoneleigh from 1352 to 1381, has been studied in detail by Hilton (1960) and is summarised by Russel and De Smet (2017). The Stoneleigh Leger Book combines a chronicle of the abbey with the records of its properties including the mansion and a mill at

Cryfield. Much detail is provided with regards to the work of the abbey's tenants at Cryfield Grange, indicating farming of arable strips, with livestock grazing taking place on fallow fields or in enclosed pastures (Asset 181, Russel and De Smet 2017) thus providing an insight into land use within the south of the Site during the medieval period.

- 5.4.7. A charter made by King John in 1203–4 mentions a dam at Cryfield which may have been intended to supply Cryfield Mill with hydraulic power (Asset 180, Russel and De Smet 2017, 16). A possibly canalised or artificially straightened stretch of the Canley Brook water course (Asset 279) is recorded in the central eastern part of the Site and considered likely attributable to the medieval monastic systems for controlling the water supply into the dam and mill system below Cryfield Grange (University of Warwick 2014c). Similarly, sandstone footings support the bridge (Asset 162) at a crossing over the channel and indicate that the bridge may originally have been a more substantial structure designed to provide a crossing over the north end of the lake created by the dam below Cryfield Grange. A large earthwork (Asset 280) stands up to 2m in height and forms the remains of a medieval dam (Spendlove 1999), which would have created a lake as far back as the new bridge on Cryfield Grange Lane (Asset 162). This lake stood at the head of a series of such water features stretching southwards down the Canley Brook valley as far as Crackley at the northern edge of Kenilworth where the ploughed out remains of a further mill downstream of Cryfield Grange Farm were also reported by Dr Stephen Hill (Spendlove 1999). The Cistercian monks thus occupied Cryfield long enough to construct at least two great dams in the Coombe through which the Canley Brook flows (southwest of Cryfield Grange Farm) to produce a head of water to drive a mill.
- 5.4.8. It is not known whether the Cryfield Mill was originally used to grind grain or to beat wool to prepare it for the production of textiles (fulling) but a deed of 1545 records that a fulling mill was situated at Cryfield thus confirming its purpose in the later medieval period (Asset 180).
- 5.4.9. Medieval remains have been recorded west of Kirby Coner Road where a possible motte has been identified (Asset 19), the suggested motte of Roger de Maure, and placed within an archaeological constraint area (Asset 65), however such a monument is not recorded on the Ordnance Survey map of 1888 or any subsequent additions (Figure 11, 12) indicating that it was not recognised as a motte in the 19th century. Further medieval remains were recorded south of Kirby Coner Road where geophysical survey recorded an area of potential kiln debris (Asset 25, Event 98, 106), placed within an archaeological constraint area (Asset 86) and underlies the University of Warwick Finance Office. While to south of this area, a post-medieval ridge and furrow earthwork was recorded during fieldwork in 2014 prior to the construction of the National Automotive Centre (Asset 27, Event 127).
- 5.4.10. In 1486, the Warwickshire antiquarian John Rous, claimed that Cryfield had become severely depopulated owing to the enclosure of arable land to create pasture for sheep-farming (Dyer 1981). Further medieval remains have been recorded immediately east of Cryfield Grange Farm (Asset 185) where documentary evidence suggests the possible site of a medieval deserted village (Asset 187). In 1564, this village paid a stone of wax yearly for maintenance of the lights in Stoneleigh Abbey while going through a period of depopulation; of 12 tenements that were here, only the Grange remained by the beginning of Henry VIII's reign c.1509 (Asset 185). A mid-19th century account also mentions various embankments discernible immediately on the left of the high road between Kenilworth and Coventry, these banks could represent the site of the village, but traces of a medieval village are no longer visible (Figure 11, 12).
- 5.4.11. Based on current evidence, there is judged to be Medium potential for medieval remains within the Site as it is

considered likely that it was agricultural land associated with the lands of Cryfield Grange throughout this period.

5.5. Post-medieval (AD 1540 – 1900)

- 5.5.1. After the Dissolution of the Monasteries, Cryfield Grange became the property of the crown and Henry VIII sold it to Robert Boucher of Twickenham in October 1538. The house, gardens, adjacent fields and dwellings (including land within the south of the Site) were said to amount to an acre and a half and included orchards and dovecotes. In addition, the grange possessed 430 acres of pasture which included land within the Wallfield, which is shown on Baker's survey of 1766 (Figure 8) within the Site. 'Mill Hill Field' is also recorded in the centre of the Site in the location of an earthen mound (barrow) which has led to the hypothesis that a medieval windmill may have been located in this area (Asset 203, Field 132 Warwick University 2014a). Similarly, 'Pottersfield' applies to the area now known as Tocil Wood which includes numerous former clay extraction ponds or puddling pits used for preparing the clay as well as watercourses that run through the wood which include artificial leats, set to direct water between the pits (Assets 44, 47)
- 5.5.2. The amount of land attached to Cryfield Grange was estimated at around 600 acres when Robert Boucher senior leased it to Henry Porter in 1541. However, a reduction in landholdings occurred between 1661 and 1736, when many of the larger woods and coppices including Roughknowles wood on the Site's southwest boundary were separated from it by the Leigh family (Russel and De Smet 2017, 26). Records from the estate also show a general reduction in the number of tenants which is consistent with the wider trend in the 14th and 15th centuries when the population of Warwickshire halved as a result of economic problems, the Black Death of 1348–1349, subsequent epidemics and possible changes in patterns of marriage and fertility (Dyer 1996, 128). Cryfield Grange came into the ownership of the Leigh family in 1560 (Rupp 2007).
- 5.5.3. Records from 1606, which record the lease of Cryfield Grange to Otho Nicholson, detail provisions for the conservation of forested areas. The lease stated that at the end of the period of 41 years the coppice called Great Whitefield should be 'left standing and groweing', especially the 'timber trees and pollingers (pollarded trees)' (Russel and De Smet 2017, 37). Whitefield Coppice is shown to the west of Cryfield Grange on Baker's survey of 1766 (Figure 8) may have extended into the western part of the Site.
- 5.5.4. Cryfield House Farm, originally part of Cryfield Grange, was acquired by the Leigh family in 1639. It was built between 1676 and 1680. In 1736 it was known as 'New Cryfield' (Asset 276) to distinguish the building from Cryfield Grange, which was known as 'Old Cryfield' (Asset 274).
- 5.5.5. A range of legal documents dated to 1639 studied by Rupp (2007) document fields and pastures connected to Cryfield Grange spreading over an area of at least 1,300 acres along with an inventory of Cryfield Farmhouse dated 1720 describing six rooms. A later account of 1817, also analysed by Rupp indicates that the farm had reduced in size but remained profitable, however by 1871 evaluation of accounts show the farm had become less profitable (Rupp 2007, 10-12). In 1871 Cryfield House Farm (Asset 276/207) which included land within the Site (where the current Cryfield Accommodation, and Redfern and Lakeside Residences are located) was recorded to be leased by Edward Swinnerton and to comprise 223 acres and employed three men and one boy. William Campbell's farm at Tocil House (where the Tocil Halls of Residence are located) comprised of 450 acres in 1871 and employed 13 men and one boy (Asset 281, Russel and De Smet 2017, 40).
- 5.5.6. Post-medieval remains have been recorded to the immediate southeast of Cryfield Grange Farm where documentary sources taken from the map book of 1766 suggest the site of a brickworks dating to the post-medieval period, where two fields are named 'The Brickyard Close' and 'Close at the Brickyard' (Asset 186, Fields 26, 27,

Figure 8).

- 5.5.7. A post-medieval farmstead, later called Tocil House Farm, comprising a three-storey house along with three outbuildings on 300 acres of land, existed to the north of today's Health Centre Road (Asset 281, Coventry City Council 2013a). Reference is made to 'Tosale' in the 14th century Stoneleigh Leger Book, the name possibly being a variant of 'teazle': perhaps a place where teazles grew in this part of Warwickshire, centuries before it was inhabited. It is unclear as to when the house was built, but it was lived in by the Parkes family in the early 19th century when the family moved there in 1817 from the post-medieval Grade II listed Canley Moat House (Asset 85, University of Warwick 2014g).
- 5.5.8. Gibbet Hill Campus located to the east of the Site contains the non-designated post-medieval Gibbet Hill Farmhouse and associated farm buildings, now used as a general maintenance centre for the University (Asset 36). Although Gibbet Hill Farmhouse retains some interesting 17th century architecture, this is not of sufficient significance to meet the bar for listing, and the later alterations have obscured, rather than illuminated, the evolution of the early house, through the 18th century and 19th century, to the present building. Nevertheless, the farmhouse and surrounding outbuildings uphold a significant historical interest that help shape and maintain a post-medieval landscape throughout the University of Warwick.
- 5.5.9. Potential post-medieval remains underlaying the Sherbourne Halls of Residence in the west of the Site have been recorded where aerial photography from 1946 identified an area of north-south aligned ridge and furrow earthworks, not picked up in a geophysical survey in and subsequent evaluation in 2011 (Asset 47, Event 239, 249).
- 5.5.10. Post-medieval remains were recorded to the immediate southwest of the standing modern Boiler Room at Westwood campus, where the Ordnance Survey map of 1886-8 recorded an 18th century cottage (Figure 11, Asset 51) and demolished c.2017 during construction of the multi-storey Kirby Corner Road carpark (Figure not reproduced: modern satellite imagery).
- 5.5.11. The site of a brickworks/kiln of early 19th century date (Asset 202), located in Old Brickyard Plantation, adjoining Gibbett Hill Road (Asset 13) was in operation by the Leigh Estate however the field was called 'Pitt Hill Field' suggesting clay extraction as early as the 18th century (Field 133, Figure 8, Cotswold Archaeology 2016, 6). Another brickworks site located along the immediate northwest boundary of the Site along Westwood Heath Road is recorded on the Ordnance Survey map of 1886, changing to a sawmill by 1925 in the (Ordnance Survey map of 1926 not reproduced), while aerial photography shows the main buildings still upstanding in 2007 where the site is used as a sub-contractor's yard until present day (Asset 50, Figure 11).
- 5.5.12. Pre-Ordnance Survey maps tend to be schematic and lack detail, although they give some idea of the nature of settlements. The approximate Site location is visible on Blaeu's 1646 map as a patch of woodland with 'Kenchworth' to the south and 'Coventre' to the northeast (Figure 7). The field numbers taken from the 18th century Baker map book have been superimposed onto the 1776 Stoneleigh Estate map and show the accurate location of the Site (Figure 8) while an annotated map found at the Modern Records Centre contains all the field names located within the Site, taken from the Baker map book and superimposed onto the Stoneleigh Estate map. This map shows the surrounding agricultural fields in detail and includes the Grade II listed Cryfield House Farmhouse (Asset 276) within Cryfield House Farm (Asset 207), the Grade II listed Cryfield Grange Farmhouse (Asset within the medieval Cryfield Grange site (Asset 185), and road systems including the Cryfield Grange Road to the south, the Gibbet Hill Road to the northeast and Kirby Corner Road to the north. Greenwood's map of 1830 is less detailed however it does record roads with greater accuracy with the addition of Westwood Heath Road to the northwest and placenames such as Hurst and Canley (Figure 9). The Parish of Stoneleigh Tithe map contains the location and names of each field located within the Site and shows the layout of the landscape underwent little major throughout the 18th and 19th

- centuries (Figures 10, 10a, 10b). A table showing the different field names within Site has been included in References in section 7.5.
- 5.5.13. The Ordnance Survey map of 1886-8 (Figure 11) provides a detailed depiction of the Site and the surrounding landscape. Several post-medieval buildings are depicted here including the Grade II listed farmhouses at Cryfield House (Asset 276) and Grade II listed farmhouse at Cryfield Grange (Asset 274) along with the non-designated farmhouses at Tocil House Farm (Asset 281) and Gibbet Hill Farm (Asset 36) which are connected via roads including the Cryfield Grange Road to the south, the Gibbet Hill Road along the centre and the Westwood Way and Kirby Corner Road to the north. The Canley Brook is shown flowing down the eastern boundary of the Site where an elevated bank is visible, suggesting the site of the non-designated medieval dam (Asset 280) where the non-designated medieval watermill is also believed to be located (Asset 180), powered by the Canley Brook canal (Asset 279, University of Warwick, 2014c, 2014d).
- 5.5.14. There is judged to be a Medium potential for post-medieval remains to survive within the Site.

5.6. Modern (AD 1900 onwards)

- 5.6.1. The Ordnance Survey maps of the early 20th century record little change across the Site and surrounding landscape until 1955 where development relating to the University of Warwick commenced with the construction of the Teachers Training College in the north of the Site (Figure 12). Warwick University in Coventry's Canley/Westwood Heath area opened in 1965 (McGrory 2022).
- 5.6.2. An auction of the contents of William Swinnerton's Cryfield House Farm (Asset 207) in 1929 revealed that it had continued to function as a dairy and sheep farm into the 20th century as he possessed 68 grand store cattle, including steers, heifers and milking cows, as well as 143 sheep and lambs (Russel and De Smet 2017, 40). A landmine is recorded to have been dropped on the Edgars' Cryfield House Farm (Asset 207) during World War II but it exploded in empty fields (Russel and De Smet 2017, 49).
- 5.6.3. The Grade II listed Cryfield Grange farmhouse continued as a working farm into the 1960s, even as the construction of the university was taking place around it (Asset 274). The Cryfield House Farm also continued as a working farm as part of the estate until 1973 (Asset 207), when the university leased its fields (but not the Grade II listed farmhouse or its outbuildings, Asset 276) to another Coventry farmer while Cryfield Grange was sold by auction in 1978. The auction catalogue shows a farm in apparent good order, complete with its poultry unit and extensive outbuildings and listed as encompassing approximately 292 acres (Rupp 2007) until Cryfield Grange was purchased by Warwick University in 2007 (Asset 274, Russel and De Smet 2017, 53).
- 5.6.4. To the northeast of Gibbet Hill campus, the Grade II* listed modern houses for Visiting Mathematicians are located and still provide accommodation to visiting academies (Asset 91). Built in 1968-70 to the designs of William Howell of Howell, the buildings are arranged around a central circular lawn and joined by low walls at either side of the front doors. The houses are of two stories with a single-storey porch, store and laundry room at the front and a single-storey study to the rear apart from the block of flats that comprise two storeys and do not include a study extension. This group of houses and flats was designed for the very particular function of accommodating academics attending mathematics symposia at Warwick University. Working outwards from the provision of study space with continuous blackboards, the architects, Howell, Killick, Partridge, and Amis, took this as their starting point to create a design which combined the practical considerations of privacy and family life, together with the more symbolic expression of a welcoming community, and devised an intricate plan of great clarity which maximised the small space. The buildings show a thoroughly considered approach to their siting and a masterful use of materials and detailing. Their placing at different compass points allows continuously shifting patterns of

light to fall across flat and sinuous surfaces. This is an intact grouping which make a particularly strong architectural statement and resulted in the granting of the RIBA Architecture Award in 1970, showing the high regard in which the design was held by its contemporaries, and it continues to be considered as amongst one of the very best works by this renowned architectural practice who were responsible for some of the best university buildings in the 1960s and 1970s.

- 5.6.5. Modern architecture is prevalent throughout the University and includes the Grade II listed 3B series No.1 sculpture of 1968 by Bernard Schottlander, issued in the courtyard in front of the Rootes Building (Asset 92). This geometrical sculpture of welded mild steel is painted a bright red and is approximately 2.6m high, 4.8m wide and 2.5m deep. It comprises three rectangular pillars varying in height, interacting with three differently sized hollow rings. The weld marks have been removed, has no plinth, and stands directly on the ground leaving a seamless form (Asset 92).
- 5.6.6. The University was one of seven universities built in the 1960s to provide more university places for a new, socially diverse cohort of students ushered in by the introduction of student grants. The University was designed by architect, Eugene Rosenberg, who prepared detailed and never fully realised proposals for buildings on a grid system which incorporated an extensive network of wide aerial pedestrian streets, raised over vehicular traffic below and designed to integrate the main academic buildings at first floor level. Whilst the plan was never fully realised, a number of key principles were retained; namely the clear zoning of academic and residential buildings and the grid-based organisation (Carter 2021). From the mid 1970s and into the early 1990s the University expanded with the construction of more moderately scaled buildings with enclosed courtyards and shrub and tree planting as evidenced in the Science Park in the east of the campus, the Westwood campus and the development of Heronbank / Lakeside residencies. Further development has taken place on campus over recent years and includes addition of; Kirby Corner multi-storey (car park), NAIC - National Automotive Innovation Centre, Maths and Stats Building, Degree Apprenticeship Centre, Materials Engineering Centre, Warwick Arts Centre refurbishment and extension, Cryfield Residences, Sports Hub, Interdisciplinary Biomedical Research Building and Faculty of Arts Building (BDP et al 2023, 24). The construction of several of these buildings prompted archaeological investigations the results of which are discussed below.
- 5.6.7. Excepting the upstanding modern buildings which are part of the University central Campus, there is judged to be a Low potential for modern archaeological remains to survive buried within the Site.

5.7. Previous Archaeological Investigations

- 5.7.1. Where relevant, previous archaeological investigations have been referred to in the period by period summary above and have informed assessment of archaeological potential of each period. The following section includes a precis of archaeological investigations presented in the order in which they were undertaken.
- 5.7.2. A site visit was made in 1961 to the medieval non-designated watermill 200m southwest of Cryfield Grange by Ordnance Survey (Asset 180, Event 256) in close proximity with the medieval non—designated dam (Asset 280).
- 5.7.3. The University of Warwick conducted a geophysical survey (Asset 98) in 1990 where two areas were selected within the campus, south of Kirby Corner Road resulting in negative evidence collected in the first area (Event 105), and placed in an archaeological constraint area (Asset 280). Further medieval remains were recorded south of Kirby Coner Road where geophysical survey recorded an area of potential kiln debris (Asset 25, Event 106), placed within an archaeological constraint area (Asset 80) and underlying the University of Warwick Finance Office.
- 5.7.4. Oaktree Cottage, located in the southern undeveloped area of the Site underwent renovation and alterations in 1996 and was subject to an archaeological watching brief. Two phases of earlier structures were located below the

- 19th century floor along with several carved sandstone blocks including 18th century window arches present within rubble from the barn floor (Event 270).
- 5.7.5. An extensive largely non-intrusive investigation undertaken in 1995-6 by the University of Warwick in advance of the University's 1994 Development Plan comprised of a geophysical survey (Events 102, 114-116), fieldwalking survey (Events 117-119, 241-248) and desk-based evaluation (Events 112, 113, Hill and Smith 1997). Approximately 290 hectares of the campus were surveyed and many non-designated monuments recorded including the upstanding Iron Age enclosure at Tocil Wood (Asset 56-58,68), the Iron Age banjo-shaped enclosure (Asset 22, 64), the area around the post-medieval Grade II listed Cryfield House Farmhouse (Asset 276) and surrounding medieval site (Asset 207) utilising aerial photography and geophysical anomalies as well as investigating prehistoric, Roman and medieval artefacts (Assets 141-145, 167-169, 277-278).
- 5.7.6. In 1997, a geophysical survey was undertaken as the first stage of an archaeological evaluation at Cryfield House Farm (Event 236). This identified traces of possible prehistoric occupation (Asset 196). The second stage of this evaluation comprised a programme of trenching and test-pitting where a possible prehistoric post-hole structure was identified within Trenches 47 and 47A (Asset 283, Event 237, Smith and Wilson 1997).
- 5.7.7. An excavation was carried out in 2002 on part of the non-designated Iron Age settlement site at the running track at Westwood, part of the University of Warwick in 2002 (Assets 21, 39, 219, 72, Event 240). The works carried out by the Centre for Lifelong Learning at Warwick University formed part of a rescue excavation following on from a pre-determination evaluation and watching brief (Event 103) where the remains of up to 14 roundhouses were recorded, arranged in a manner to suggest at least two phases of occupation including a banjo enclosure (Assets 22, 64). Finds from the site comprised pottery and animal remains, some of which may have been 'ritually' placed and a crucible suggesting silver-working was taking place on the site.
- 5.7.8. Fieldwork occurred in 2006 where six trial trenches opened north of the running track prior to the development of the indoor tennis centre at the north end of the Site, identified no archaeological features as any remaining archaeological deposits are thought to have been removed during modern landscaping in the 1960s (Event 101).
- 5.7.9. Investigations occurred in 2006 where aerial photography across the University campus was interpreted by the University of Warwick (Event 104).
- 5.7.10. The centre of campus underwent an evaluation in 2006 prior to the construction of the International Digital Laboratory building where one of five trenches uncovered a former watercourse (Asset 54) of the present-day stream and separate ditch of a similar alignment (Asset 55, Event 120).
- 5.7.11. Archaeological salvage recording took place at Milburn House in the north of the Site where a watching brief took place in 2008 however nothing of archaeological significance was recorded (Event 123).
- 5.7.12. A desk-based assessment was carried out in 2008 by Birmingham Archaeology to assess the archaeological potential of an area of land adjacent to Tocil Ponds (Event 271, 131).
- 5.7.13. A watching brief followed by an evaluation was undertaken in 2009 prior to the construction of the Bluebell Halls of Residences, located in the east of the Site however the works did not identify any archaeological features or deposits (Events 100, 132).
- 5.7.14. A magnetometer survey (Event 239) was undertaken during 2011 in advance of proposals for new student residences off Scarman Road. The survey identified widespread magnetic debris associated with earlier landscaping groundworks or earlier industrial activity. The report authors suggested that this debris could have masked weak archaeological anomalies, although the report also noted that other anomalies should have been identified. The

- survey was followed by the excavation of a total of 15 evaluation trenches (Event 249) later in 2011 where no archaeological finds or features were identified.
- 5.7.15. Field observations of a number of ancient hedgerows at the Warwick University Science Park were carried out during a field visit by the Conservation Officer and the Tree Preservation Officer in 2012 where hedgerows investigated dated back to the late 17th century (Event 130).
- 5.7.16. Wessex Archaeology carried out a detailed gradiometer survey in 2013 as part of the archaeological works for HS2 on land off Coventry Road, Kenilworth (Event 262). The survey revealed several archaeological features which may be associated with the non-designated deserted medieval Millburn village (Asset 190) and the non-designated medieval Millburn grange recorded in the area (Asset 185). The medieval settlement is thought to be located to the southwest, closer to the Canley Brook (Asset 279), but this might represent an extension of the settlement or associated agricultural features.
- 5.7.17. Fieldwork undertaken in 2014 in the form of 11 trenches prior to the construction of the National Automotive Innovation Centre recovered a single prehistoric flint tool in the topsoil and was subsequently retained due to Iron Age activity evident in the surrounding landscape (Asset 15, Event 127).
- 5.7.18. An archaeological strip, map and sample was undertaken at University of Warwick Science Park in 2015 during the construction of a new car park (Event 134). The site lies within an area of potential, archaeological deposits associated with the utilisation of this area from the prehistoric, Romano-British and medieval periods. The work established that a clay layer, recorded beneath the topsoil, had probably been recently imported, perhaps from the surrounding locality.
- 5.7.19. A geophysical survey was conducted by Magnitude Surveys followed by an archaeological watching brief and evaluation undertaken by Cotswold Archaeology in 2016 on land off Scarman Road at the University of Warwick. This fieldwork was to inform a planning application for the redevelopment of the site as a Sports Hub with associated artificial pitches and services, forming part of the University of Warwick Masterplan 2008-2018 (Events 254, 138, 139). The only features identified during the watching brief comprised a shallow U-shaped ditch and part of a possible second ditch, both recorded as undated in test-pit TP11 (Asset 282, Cotswold Archaeology 2016a). Despite the perceived archaeological potential of the site only one undated pit feature was identified during the evaluation (Asset 225, Cotswold Archaeology 2016b).
- 5.7.20. A gradiometer survey was undertaken in February 2016 of the Cryfield football pitches (Events 251, 252, 253) where a number of ferrous type magnetic anomalies were identified, which are the result of modern landscaping in the near surface, and a modern buried service, however, no anomalies of archaeological, or possible archaeological interest could be identified.
- 5.7.21. An evaluation was carried out for the Sherbourne Residences at Warwick University in June 2015 by Archaeology Warwickshire. Investigations comprised 11 trial trenches however no archaeological deposits were identified, and no finds were recovered (Event 250).
- 5.7.22. Archaeology Warwickshire conducted an evaluation in 2017 at Cryfield Residences, on land northeast of Cryfield House Farm prior to development of Cryfield Halls of Residence where nine trial trenches were placed and revealed archaeological deposits along with a pit containing possible Roman pottery (Event 266). This was followed by an excavation in 2018 where the Roman pit previously identified in the evaluation was found to be part of a line of five pits or possible postholes and reinterpreted as medieval in date (Asset 224, Event 268).
- 5.7.23. A desk-based assessment was undertaken in 2023 by Cotswold Archaeology to assess the archaeological potential of land off Gibbet Hill Road and Westwood Heath Road, University of Warwick (Event 284, Cotswold 2023). The

land is proposed for the development of the University of Warwick Social Science Quarter and was followed by a geophysical survey later that year where undated remains were recorded as anomalies of undetermined origin (Asset 286). These anomalies are likely to be agricultural and/or modern in origin however an archaeological origin cannot be discounted (Event 285, Magnitude Surveys 2023).

5.8. Aerial Photography and Satellite Imagery

- 5.8.1. An online search of aerial photography available on the Historic England website along with a search of aerial photography held at the Modern Records Centre, University of Warwick was consulted and included in References in Section 7.
- 5.8.2. Aerial photographs from July 1953 show the non-designated banjo-shaped enclosure in Rough Close Field, on the north side of the non-designated Westwood Iron Age Settlement, now underlying the running track (Asset 22) and placed within an archaeological constraint area (Asset 64, No. 0019. RAF/58/1182, Barnes 2004).
- 5.8.3. Aerial photographs taken in 1946 provide the only firm evidence of the roundhouse structures prior to the Westwood Iron Age settlement investigations (Asset 39, 21, 219, Event 103, 240), placed within an archaeological constraint area (Asset 72). The roundhouses structures appear to follow the line of the present Kirby Coner Road until visibility decrease towards Canley (No. 5096, TWD/UK12/80, No. 5097, TWD/UK12/80 and No. 5098, TWD/UK12/80, Barnes 2004).
- 5.8.4. In the 1946 aerial photograph, the prehistoric sunken way/ hollow way that passes north to south beside the mound clearly bows around the structure, as does the equivalent boundary marked on the Ordnance Survey map from 1888 to present (Figures 11, 12, No. 5255, TUD/UK/12/18). The mound in question is wider and higher at its northern end, presenting a classic wedge shape (Asset 42, 43, 76, Barnes 2004).
- 5.8.5. By 1953, aerial photography (No. 5256, TUD/UK/12/28) shows the first of a range of new buildings on the Site and the aerial photograph in 1963 depicts the re-building that had taken place for the new Teacher Training College on the Westwood site (No. 0183, 543/RAF/1698, Barnes 2004).
- 5.8.6. The aerial photography from 1948 shows the prehistoric barrow located north of the post-medieval Grade II listed Cryfield Farmhouse (Asset 203) with earlier field boundaries now removed and damaged by deep ploughing and heavy machinery of potato cultivation (No.4328, CPE/UK/2546, Barnes 2004).
- 5.8.7. To the east and south of the post-medieval Grade II listed Cryfield Grange Farmhouse (Asset 274) are clear indications of the non-designated deserted medieval settlement (Asset 187), still visible in 1947 on aerial photography (No. 5110, CPE/UK/2011). The site of the medieval non-designated watermill (Asset 180) and non-designated medieval dam located (Asset 280) southwest of the post-medieval Grade II listed Cryfield Grange Farmhouse are also visible on aerial photography from 1947 (No. 5110, CPE/UK/2546).
- 5.8.8. No previously unrecorded heritage assets were identified through the review of aerial photography.

5.9. LiDAR Data

5.9.1. For this desk-based assessment, a 1m spatial resolution Digital Surface Model (DSM) and Digital Terrain Model (DTM) have been produced from processing LiDAR Point Cloud, and subsequently enhanced by implementing different visualisation techniques. Analytical Hillshading (x16), Sky View Factor (SVF), Visualisation for Archaeological Topography (VAT), Simple Local Relief model (SLRM), Laplacian Filter and VAT & Analytical Hillshading (x16) have been produced by using the software Relief Visualization Toolbox 2.2.1 and SAGA GIS. A plan showing the processed LiDAR data is included at Figure 13 and clearly demonstrates the extensive landscaping that has occurred across the Site excepting the south where arable land use prevails. No new archaeological features

are visible within the LiDAR data showing the Site.

5.10. Historic Landscape Character

- 5.10.1. The Character Area located to the southwest of the city centre on the fringes of the Coventry–Warwickshire border. encompasses the whole of the University of Warwick Campus including Halls of Residence, sports facilities, and all University buildings. It is surrounded by fields to the southwest and by residential areas on all other sides. The Canley Brook runs along its southeast border (University of Warwick Character Area, 2013a)
- 5.10.2. The Character Area incorporates archaeological evidence for one of Coventry's earliest occupation sites, an Iron Age settlement to the north of Kirby Corner Road (Assets 21, 39, 72, 219). As discussed above, archaeological excavations revealed Iron Age round houses with pits, gullies and ditches and recovered pottery and bone (Event 103, 240). As noted in Section 5.8, aerial photography suggests the presence of more Iron Age enclosures and pits along Westwood Way (Asset 42, 43, 76) and an Iron Age/Roman banjo enclosure located east of Westwood Way (Asset 22, 64). Evidence dating to the medieval period includes a possible motte that is located to the west of Kirby Corner Road (Asset 19). By 1597an estate map (not illustrated) records small, enclosed fields in the northern half of the Character Area, whilst the south may have been an area of common land or waste (Figure not reproduced). The 1597 survey also records a road on the same alignment as the current Kirby Corner Road. By the late 18th century, a small hamlet had grown around the edge of the common and on roadside waste at Kirby Corner and another existed at the north end of Kirby Corner Road and much of the remaining common had been enclosed as fields. The pattern of 16th century enclosures further north remained unchanged. A farmstead, later called Tocil House Farm (Asset 281) and comprising a house and three outbuildings, existed to the north of today's Health Centre Road University of Warwick Character Area, 2013a).
- 5.10.3. The Character Area underwent few major changes in the 19th century and the landscape remained agricultural. The alignment of Gibbet Hill Road, which had previously run north towards Tocil House Farm before taking a sharp bend westward towards Kirby Corner, changed between 1846 and 1888 and took a more direct route across the enclosed fields (Asset 281). It was not until the period immediately after the Second World War that an area in the north was used for the building of a teacher training college and two areas along Kirby Corner Road were changed to sports fields. The site of the college was redeveloped between 1955 and 1977 and new college buildings were built. Further south Warwick University also built its first campus buildings during this period and created playing fields on the agricultural land immediately to its north. Subsequent years saw the development of much of this area for Warwick University including halls of residence, sports facilities and departmental buildings. Although much of the area is now built up, development seems to have respected the former landscape in places, and some former hedgerow boundaries have been retained, particularly in the north of the Character Area (University of Warwick Character Area, 2013a).
- 5.10.4. The modern Character Area is comprised almost entirely of buildings and facilities associated with the University of Warwick. The core, original 1970s lecture buildings are arranged in a central block around University Road and the rest of the university gradually expanded outwards from this area. There is a mix of building styles and materials which reflects the gradual development of the University. In general, however, the buildings are large, flat-roofed and rectangular in plan with large areas allocated for parking. There are trees, grass verges and other landscaping along the roadsides, many historic hedgerows and landscape features have been retained and incorporated in the University's landscaping. Halls of Residence are located around the edges of the campus and comprise of small, red-brick, roofed buildings generally arranged in courtyards and / or geometric shapes, located in an open green setting with areas of woodland nearby. Sports facilities including extensive playing fields are present to the

northwest of the character area (University of Warwick Character Area, 2013a).

5.11. Site Walkover Survey

- 5.11.1. A walkover survey of the University of Warwick campus was conducted on the 8th and 9th of January 2024 and included the undeveloped land within the south of the Site. The weather conditions throughout the survey were dry and mild with variable overhead cloud cover and good visibility. Every accessible area of the main campus was walked except for the private agricultural fields to the south where a photograph was taken of each field from a safe accessible point along the Cryfield Grange Road in the southwest of the Site (Plate 4, 20, 21,) and the A429 Kenilworth Road along the immediate southeast Site boundary (Plate 22). The main campus was walked to provide coverage of the entire area and identification of the non-designated heritage assets within the Site boundary described above.
- 5.11.2. The location of the undated cropmarked features, present in the southeast of the Site was visited during the walkover survey. However the field could not be surveyed systematically due to private land ownership and the nearby HS2 construction work in the area (Asset 189, Plate 22). These features could range from the prehistoric to the medieval period, if associated with the non-designated prehistoric flint artefact (Asset 143), Mesolithic flint scatter (Asset 159), Roman coins (Asset 164) and medieval pottery sherds (Asset 152) recovered from fieldwalking undertaken in 1996 of the fields to the west, beyond the field in the photograph (Event 246, 247). The proximity of the non-designated Milburn deserted medieval settlement c.200m south of the cropmarked features should also be considered and may indicate a medieval date for the features however this site could not be visited due to HS2 construction work in the area (Asset 191, Event 259).
- 5.11.3. The walkover survey began in the south of the site where the agricultural fields were overlooked and photographed as noted above, along with the Grade II listed post-medieval Cryfield Grange Farmhouse (Asset 274, Plate 1) and the possible location of the non-designated medieval building thought to be a possible location for the medieval Stoneleigh Abbey site (Asset 179, Plate 4). This was carried out while avoiding trespass on private land and travelling along the Cryfield Grange Road which crossed the Canley Brook via the 'New Bridge' (Asset 162, Plate 3).
- 5.11.4. The site of the non-designated medieval watermill and associated dam was located in the south of the Site (Assets 180, 280 Plate 2), west of the current watercourse of Canley Brook (Asset 279) and the immediate southeast of the possible non-designated medieval building possibly associated with the monastic activity at Cryfield. The area was difficult to access due to overgrown, boggy terrain however a photographic record was achieved.
- 5.11.5. The modern upstanding Cryfield Sports Pavilion, located along the Leighfield Road, south of Cryfield House Farm overlies an area of possible Bronze Age occupation. No evidence for upstanding features is present in this area and any buried remains are considered to have likely been destroyed by the constriction of the buildings and associated landscaping works. However the presence of such a settlement highlights the potential for further prehistoric activity within the surrounding landscape (Asset 196, Event 236-7, Plate 9).
- 5.11.6. Cryfield House Farm (Asset 207), containing the Grade II listed post-medieval Cryfield House farmhouse (Asset 276, Plate 5), located along the Leighfield Road in the south of campus is a possible location for the medieval monastic centre at Cryfield (Asset 144). This area was difficult to reach due to the location of farm house within agricultural land and a closer photograph was not possible.
- 5.11.7. To the north of this, beyond Cryfield House Farm (Asset 207) spans a large area of mainly undeveloped land including a raised mound where the non-designated prehistoric barrow and medieval windmill was once located, now used as a congregational area for students at the University of Warwick during summer months (Asset 203, Plate 6). A non-designated cropmarked linear feature (Asset 205) is also located to the northwest of Cryfield House

Farm within the undeveloped land, however the area was largely overgrown and no associated remains were identified. A pool of water was visible to the immediate north of the cropmarked features, surrounded by trees and likely to be the location of the non-designated medieval fishponds used for breeding and storing fish (Asset 204, Plate 7), associated with the possible location of the monastic site at Cryfield (Asset 206).

- 5.11.8. The undeveloped land containing the raised mound (Asset 203) and fishponds (Asset 204) is bound by woodland to the northeast where the Ordnance Survey of 1886 depicts the Brickyard plantation (Asset 13) containing the site of a post-medieval brick kiln (Asset 202). This area was observed to be occupied by dense vegetation and contained the modern Cryfield Cottages used by the University as student accommodation. Evidence of the brick kiln was likely destroyed during the construction of the modern cottages (Plate 8).
- 5.11.9. The non-designated Iron Age Westwood Settlement located in the north of the Site (Asset 21, 39, 219), including the non-designated Iron Age banjo enclosure (Asset 22, 64) is no longer visible in an are no occupied by the running track and sports fields, (Plate 10), however the bank and rampart is still visible in places, particularly the area between the Gatehouse (Community Safety Hub) and Boiler Room where it runs under the Lord Bhattacharyya Way Road, towards the Engineering Building (Asset 21, Plate 11).
- 5.11.10. Another possible Iron Age enclosure located at Coventry University Sports Ground is located west of Westwood Way Road and no longer visible due to landscaping works for the sports grounds (Asset 42, 43). This earthwork is likely to be associated with the Iron Age Westwood settlement and banjo enclosure located on the opposite side of Westwood Way Road to the east and placed within an area of archaeological constraint (Asset 76). The area was visited during the walkover survey and although the earthwork is no longer visible and lies outside the Site boundary, its association with the nearby Westwood settlement and banjo enclosure warranted a visit due to its high archaeological potential (Plate 12).
- 5.11.11. The walkover survey included the International Digital Laboratory building, where the former watercourse (Asset 54) of the present-day stream along with a separate ditch of similar alignment were recorded (Asset 55, Event 120). The trench has long since been backfilled however the exact location of the trench where the Iron Age features were recorded can still be located using the plans from the archaeological evaluation report (Asset, 54, 55, Event 120, Plate 19, Birmingham Archaeology, 2007).
- 5.11.12. Medieval remains have been recorded west of Kirby Coner Road where a possible motte has been identified (Asset 19; Plate 13), the suggested motte of Roger de Maure, located within an archaeological constraint area (Asset 65). The earthwork is partially covered by trees with the modern addition of a landscaped garden and water feature constructed into its northern base, belonging to the University of Warwick (Garden of Contemplation).
- 5.11.13. The non-designated post-medieval Tocil House Farm is no longer present within the Site and has been replaced by the Tocil Halls of Residence located along the University Road (Asset 281). The site of the former Tocil House Farm was visited during the walkover survey however no evidence of the farm's existence could be found due to the modern redevelopment of the area (Plate 14).
- 5.11.14. Tocil Wood and Nature Reserve, although located outside the Site boundary was visited during the walkover survey where the non-designated rectilinear Iron Age enclosure was still visible in the form of extant ditch and ramparts evident throughout the wood (Asset 56-58, Plate 15), placed within an area of archaeological constraint (Asset 68). No other earthworks apart from the ditch and rampart could be seen due to the dense vegetation within Tocil Wood.
- 5.11.15. The non-designated post-medieval Gibbet Hill Farmhouse is located within the grounds of the Gibbet Hill campus to the east of the Site and currently functions as a ground maintenance centre for the University of Warwick. The

walkover survey also recorded a notable gabled timber porch at the front door of the non-designated post-medieval farmhouse building (Asset 36, Plate 16). To the northeast of Gibbet Hill campus, the Grade II* listed modern houses for Visiting Mathematicians were visited during the walkover survey where six buildings were recorded and exhibited contemporary architectural ideas of the 1960s and 70s within the fabric of its buildings (Asset 91, Plate 17).

5.11.16. Other modern architecture is prevalent throughout the University including the Grade II listed 3B series No.1 sculpture of 1968 located in front of the Rootes Building and visited during the walkover survey (Asset 92, Plate 18). This geometrical sculpture of welded mild steel is painted a bright red and is approximately 2.6m high, 4.8m wide and 2.5m deep. It comprises three rectangular pillars varying in height, interacting with three differently sized hollow rings. The weld marks have been removed, has no plinth, and stands directly on the ground leaving a seamless form (Asset 92, Plate 18).

6. CONCLUSION

6.1. Direct Impacts

- 6.1.1. Potential impacts on known or unknown buried archaeological remains which may survive within the Site relate to the possibility of disturbing, removing or destroying *in situ* remains and artefacts during ground-breaking works (including excavation, construction and other works) associated with future developments as identified in the SPD.
- 6.1.2. The SPD identifies projects to be delivered over the next ten years to 2033. This includes the proposed Science and Engineering Precinct and the Social Sciences Quarter together with solar PV farms. Taking into account the committed and proposed projects, a capacity of 13,000 sqm floorspace is identified to allow for other projects to come forward in the period to 2033. Ground breaking works required for the construction of these new buildings have the potential to impact both known and hitherto unknown remains. Of particular note is the proposed development of the Science Precinct and new extension to Physics Building which would extend into an area of 'Archaeological Constraint' as defined by the Coventry HER (Figure 3 & 4). The SPD identifies that in addition to new buildings, the University is likely to refurbish some existing buildings to ensure that they continue to be fit for purpose. Some of this can be categorised as cosmetic refurbishment, whilst some buildings will need more detailed upgrades to their fabric in order to maintain standards of use and functionality. If the more detailed upgrades include changes to drainage below ground utilities or landscaping i.e. if they involve ground breaking works there will be a potential to impact upon hitherto unknown buried archaeological remains.
- 6.1.3. The SPD includes proposals for the use of the undeveloped fields in the west of the Site for a solar development as well as solar development in the centre of the Site. Works associated with the proposed solar PV farms may have the potential to disturb hitherto unknown remains in this part of the Site. Appropriate assessment will need to be undertaken as part of any future planning application.
- 6.1.4. It is important to ensure that all further developments proposals for the Site include an appropriate level of assessment of all aspects of development including landscape improvement works such as tree planting, courtyard creation, gardens, growing areas, orchards, terraces, walkways and creation of new water waterbodies. Depending on their location such proposals have the potential to disturb hitherto unknown buried archaeological remains. Similarly, potential proposals for Landscape and Sustainable Drainage Systems (SuDS) associated with future developments may include ground disturbance and/or alterations to existing water systems. Any such developments around the artificially straightened stretch of the Canley Brook water course which are part of historic land management which in some areas of the Site extends back into the medieval period would require careful management. Potential proposals for changes to historic land and water management practices thus also

have the potential to adversely impact upon both known and hitherto unknown archaeological remains. Archaeological investigation works thus may be required in advance of any ground breaking works associated with such proposals to ensure that archaeological remains associated with historic land and water management practices are adequately recorded and protected.

- 6.1.5. This assessment has identified that the Site contains three Grade II listed buildings, a single Grade II* listed building (Figure 2), 40 non-designated heritage assets (Figure 3), four archaeological constraint areas (Figure 3), 11 archaeological findspots (Figure 5) and 50 archaeological events (Figure 6). These attest to a wide range of evidence for human activity and settlement of the land within the Site from the prehistoric period onwards. The 50 previous archaeological events also demonstrate a legacy of previous archaeological investigations across the Site resulting from the work of Dr Stephen Hill, former University Archaeologist, as well as those prompted by the extensive previous development across the Site.
- 6.1.6. There is evidence of prehistoric settlement and funerary activity within the centre of the Site including the non-designated Bronze Age roundhouses underlying the Sports Pavilion (Asset 196, Event 237) and the upstanding non-designated Bronze Age barrow, located north of Cryfield House Farm (Asset 203). Evidence of Iron Age remains are present within the northern part of the Site where a non-designated Iron Age settlement (Asset 21, 39, 219, Events 103, 240) and the non-designated Iron Age banjo enclosure (Asset 22, 64) were found during archaeological investigations in the area, and non-designated Iron Age ditch, located near the International Digital Laboratory building (Asset 55, Event 120). There is a potential for future development in this area to impact upon as yet undiscovered and unexcavated Iron Age remains although much of this area has already undergone extensive archaeological investigation with ground subsequently levelled in advance of existing modern development. Given the survival of both upstanding and buried prehistoric remains within the Site, the potential for previously unrecorded prehistoric remains to survive on the Site beyond the footprints of modern University buildings is considered to be Medium to High.
- 6.1.7. Based on the limited evidence for Roman activity within the Site, there is judged to be a Low potential for Roman remains to survive within the Site although the possibility of uncovering remains associated with Roman activity cannot be ruled out.
- 6.1.8. Medieval sources indicate that the land in the south of the Site, including land associated with the non-designated post-medieval Cryfield House Farm (Asset 207) and the land around the non-designated medieval Grange (Asset 185) was in the possession of Stoneleigh Abbey (a Cistercian House). Shortly after its foundation the monks moved their monastic buildings away from Cryfield to Stoneleigh, claiming that the site at Cryfield was too disturbed. Traces of the central monastic buildings have yet to be discovered, however two possible locations have been hypothesised including the remains of a possible medieval building (Asset 179) recorded at Oaktree Cottage, to the southwest of Cryfield Grange Farmhouse (Asset 274) and the site of Cryfield House Farm (Asset 206) where the substantial sandstone structures (Asset 206) of Cryfield House (Asset 207, 276) along with the presence of medieval pottery and pits found during archaeological fieldwork in the area (Asset 224, Events 266, 268) suggest a second possible location for the medieval monastic building. Further medieval sources support the location of the monastic building near to Cryfield Grange Farmhouse where the 14th century Stoneleigh Leger Book mentions the monastic properties including a mansion and mill at Cryfield (Asset 180, Hilton 1960, Russel and De Smet 2017) while the documented activities of its tenants indicate farming of arable strips, with livestock grazing taking place on fallow fields or in enclosed pastures (Asset 181, Russel and De Smet 2017). Further medieval remains have been recorded immediately east of Cryfield Grange Farm (Asset 185) where documentary evidence suggests the possible site of a medieval deserted village (Aset 187). Medieval remains have also been recorded to the north of the Site where a possible motte has been identified (Asset 19). Based on current evidence, there is judged to be Medium potential for medieval remains within the Site as it is considered likely that it was agricultural land associated with the lands

of Cryfield Grange throughout this period.

- 6.1.9. The landscape across the Site was largely in agricultural use throughout the post-medieval period with the emergence of farms including the Grade II listed post-medieval farmhouses at Cryfield Grange Farm (Asset 274) and Cryfield House Farm (Asset 276) along with non-designated post-medieval farms including Gibbet Hill Farm (Asset 36) and Tocil House Farm (Asset 281) where each farm has either been incorporated into the University or demolished to make way for new development and any surrounding buried archaeological deposits are likely to have been subject to direct construction impacts. The only exception to this is the Cryfield Grange Farmhouse which remains upstanding in a location of undeveloped land. Should any future development proposals be submitted within this area they would require to be subject to an appropriate level of assessment. Overall, there is judged to be a Medium potential for post-medieval remains to survive within the Site.
- 6.1.10. Excepting the upstanding modern buildings which are part of the University central Campus, there is judged to be a Low potential for modern archaeological remains to survive buried within the Site.

6.2. Mitigation

- 6.2.1. National planning policies and planning guidance contained within the National Planning Policy Framework (DLUHC 2023) and its accompanying Planning Practice Guide (MCHLG 2016, updated November 2023, historic environment section published 2014, updated July 2019), as well as local planning policies referred to within Section 2.4 of this report, require a mitigation response that is designed to take cognisance of the possible impacts upon heritage assets by a Proposed Development and avoid, minimise or offset any such impacts as appropriate.
- 6.2.2. It is noted that the NPPF states that a local planning authority should require developers to 'record and advance understanding of the significance of any heritage assets to be lost (wholly or in part) in a manner proportionate to their importance and the impact' (DLUHC 2023: Para 211).
- 6.2.3. Any future developments proposed within the Site will be required to assess the potential for construction works to impact directly or indirectly upon below ground remains. As demonstrated in Section 5.7 the Site has a long and detailed history of archaeological investigations and much of the Site area has already been subject to some form of archaeological assessment which has demonstrated that archaeological remains survive well in previously undeveloped areas.
- 6.2.4. This assessment has established that the archaeological potential of the campus varies by period and according to location within the campus. A plan showing archaeological potential zones based on the evidence presented in this assessment is included at Figure 14. This plan is necessarily broad but can be used as a guide for mitigation proposals as part of the SPD.
 - High Archaeological Potential
- 6.2.5. Areas of High Archaeological Potential include the land surrounding the Grade II listed post-medieval Cryfield House Farmhouse (Asset 276), located to the south of the main campus along with land surrounding the Grade II listed post-medieval Cryfield Grange Farmhouse (Asset 274), located to the south of the Site. Both areas are candidates for the lost location of the medieval monastic buildings of Cryfield associated with Stoneleigh Abbey. The largely agricultural lands in the south of the Site have also been assigned a High Archaeological Potential where several medieval non-designated features have been recorded, including the watermill (Asset 180), dam (Asset 280) and possible deserted Cryfield Grange settlement (Asset 187) along with associated medieval Grange (Asset 185).
- 6.2.6. The Site of the possible motte in the north of the Site is included as an area of High Archaeological Potential (Asset

- 19, 65) along with undeveloped land in the northeast of the Site, near the Claycroft and Tocil Halls of Residence.
- 6.2.7. In areas of High Archaeological Potential a survey will be required prior to any development and a detailed strategy for investigation put forward. It is advised that potential mitigation may take the form of preservation in situ and consequently flexibility of development design should be considered. In some instances, a phased programme of further archaeological works may be appropriate to ensure preservation by record. Any such requirement for mitigation would be subject to further consultation with the relevant Local Planning Authority, as advised by the Planning Archaeologists for Coventry and/or Warwickshire. All archaeological investigations should be informed by the West Midlands Regional Research Framework (2016).

Medium Archaeological Potential

- 6.2.8. Areas of Medium Archaeological Potential include the locations of Iron Age settlement remains recorded during excavations at Westwood campus (Assets 21, 22, 39, 64 219, Events 103, 240) which highlight the potential for further archaeological occupation in the surrounding area and although limited fieldwork to the immediate north lacked datable results (Event 101), the sports fields to the north beyond the Westwood Campus Tennis Courts may present opportunity to identify further archaeological activity.
- 6.2.9. Medium Archaeological Potential has also been identified on undeveloped land off Gibbet Hill Road and Westwood Heath Road to the northwest of the Site which appear to have been undisturbed in recent years and where evidence for Iron Age and Bronze Age settlement activity has been found nearby. Although a geophysical survey of the area identified no anomalies suggestive of significant archaeological activity, anomalies of an undetermined origin have been detected and while these are likely to be agricultural and/or modern in origin, an archaeological origin cannot be discounted (Asset 286, Events 284, 285).
- 6.2.10. Other areas of Medium Archaeological Potential include lands to the south and southeast of Leighfield Road, beyond the Cryfield Sports Pavilion where Bronze Age occupational remains were recorded (Asset 196, Event 237) which may extend beyond the limits of the previously developed area to include the undated linear feature to the south (Asset 195), however landscaping associated with the creation of the sports fields may have truncated and/or removed any surviving archaeological potential. The largely undeveloped agricultural lands around the western margins of the Site have also been assigned a Medium Archaeological Potential. While few non-designated features have been recorded in these areas, they appear to have remained undeveloped in recent years and thus any archaeological remains that do survive may be relatively intact and undisturbed.
- 6.2.11. In Areas of Medium Archaeological Potential it is advised that potential mitigation may take the form of archaeological evaluation or watching brief to ensure preservation by record. In some cases an initial programme on non intrusive survey such as fieldwalking, geophysical survey or topographic recording of the extent of the clay pits in the north of the Site may be more appropriate. The detail of works required would be subject to further consultation with Local Planning Authority, as advised by the Planning Archaeologists for Coventry and/or Warwickshire All archaeological investigations should be informed by the West Midlands Regional Research Framework (2016).

Low Archaeological Potential

6.2.12. Land around the main development areas of the Warwick University Campus have undergone numerous archaeological investigations prompted by the continuous development of the University producing limited archaeological results. Sites include the evaluation prompted by the construction of the Digital Laboratory Building (Event 120), another by the construction of the National Automotive Innovation Centre (Event 127) and a third undertaken before the construction of the Bluebell Student Residence in the east (Event 100). These areas of

investigation suggest Low Archaeological Potential. The Sports and Wellness Hub located to the west of the Site and subject to an evaluation in 2016 also presents an area of Low Archaeological Potential (Events 138, 139). Land around the Sherbourne Halls of Residence to the west of the Site have produced little evidence of archaeological activity and are thus also considered to have a Low Archaeological Potential

6.2.13. In Areas of Low Archaeological Potential archaeological investigation is likely to be limited and in some cases may not be required. These may include areas where there has been some limited previous archaeological investigation such as watching brief or evaluation where the remains recovered where of negligible to no value and no further investigation as considered necessary. The detail of any further works required would be subject to further consultation with Local Planning Authority, as advised by the Planning Archaeologists for Coventry and/or Warwickshire All archaeological investigations should be informed by the West Midlands Regional Research Framework (2016).

Unknown Archaeological Potential

- 6.2.14. As shown on Figure 14 some areas of the Site have not been assigned an archaeological potential. These tend to be those areas of the Site that have previously been subject to some development but where the full extent of disturbance and/or extent and depth of any associated archaeological deposits is unknown. As for the identified Archaeological Potential Areas mitigation will need to be tailored to the specific nature of the development and supported by evidence of anticipated depths of archaeological survival compared to construction depths.
- 6.2.15. CIfA (2022) and The Association of Local Government Archaeological Officers (ALGAO) (Mann, 2023) have recently noted the need for public engagement in archaeology. The Levelling-up and Regeneration Act 2023 also notes that where heritage assets are to be impacted a consideration should be given to "enhancing" the asset. Archaeological works undertaken as part of future development on the campus offer an opportunity for a programme of public engagement and/or enhancement. Engagement could include opportunities for students and member so the public to visit archaeological excavations within the site or take part in surveys (if conditions/circumstances allow). For example, given the relative success of fieldwalking within some parts of the Site, systematic fieldwalking of open areas of the Site could help to better inform better about the distribution of Mesolithic and Neolithic finds materials (see Watt 2011). In addition desk based, digital and on-site interpretation and dissemination about any archaeological remains which may survive on the Site or to wider archaeological and historical information around the area. The University of Warwick already hosts excellent website (https://warwick.ac.uk/about/campus/archaeology) which maps and describes some of the main archaeological sites across the campus and provides 3D digital reconstructions. Any works undertaken as part of future developments could be used to further enhance the site and provide links to further information.
- 6.2.16. Consideration should also be given during the preliminary stages of any planning applications relating to future developments, where relevant, within the Site to referencing historic land boundaries in the Site layout and commemoration of the farm, fields, clay pits and station perhaps in the naming of streets, public realm or within any new buildings proposed. Future developments, where relevant, may also see improvement to the public realm and development within the currently largely agricultural land in the south of the Site. Incorporation of information about the history of Cryfield Grange could be incorporated into any public information produced as part of any future development within these areas. The University of Warwick has a legacy of previous archaeological investigations. Proposals to animate the public realm through the use of memorable elements in key locations are for future developments and could include the provision of historic and archaeological information to contribute to 'placemaking'. The scope and requirement of any community benefit of any future development proposal should be agreed by the University and be undertaken in consultation with the Local Planning Authority, as advised by the

Appendix 1: Assessment Scope & Criteria

Scope of the Assessment

This report details the results of a Heritage Impact Assessment and aims to identify and map the nature of the heritage resource within the site and surrounding study area. Where possible, the assessment will evaluate the likely impact from Proposed Development, upon the known and potential heritage resource.

This report will include recommendations for mitigation measures and / or further archaeological works; where the archaeological potential of the site warrants, or where additional information on the site is required.

Further works could include additional research, monitoring of geotechnical investigations, programmes of archaeological surveying and / or field evaluation. The results of any further studies can be used to inform the nature of any subsequent mitigation measures (if required) and provide advice upon the scope and design of the Proposed Development.

The assessment has used the sources listed in the main text to identify and map heritage assets and other relevant find spots or evidence within the site and defined study area. Heritage assets are defined in national planning guidance and can include designated assets (Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings etc.), standing, buried or submerged remains, historic buildings and structures, parks and gardens and areas, sites and landscapes - whether designated or not.

Assessment Criteria

Archaeological Potential

Consideration of archaeological potential will be informed by the number, density and distribution of known heritage assets of a specific period and/or type within the Study Area. The proximity of such assets to the Site and/or the similarities/dissimilarities in topographical location between the Site and the location of known assets will also be a factor in determining potential. Previous land use on the Site will also be a consideration in assessing potential, as later disturbance may have removed or damaged earlier buried archaeological remains and therefore may have reduced the potential for archaeological remains to survive on Site. Consideration will also be given to evidence from landform change in the study area and the possibility that natural deposits such as colluvium or alluvium may have buried archaeological remains. The potential for surviving archaeological evidence of past activity within the Site is expressed in the report as ranging between the scales of:

- High The available evidence suggests a high likelihood for past activity within the site and a strong potential for archaeological evidence to survive intact or reasonably intact;
- Medium The available evidence suggests a reasonable likelihood for past activity within the site and consequently there is a potential that archaeological evidence could survive.
- Low The available evidence suggests archaeological evidence of activity is unlikely to survive within the site, although some minor land-use may have occurred.
- Uncertain Insufficient information to assess.

Buried archaeological evidence is, by its very nature, an unknown quantity which can never be 100% identified during a desk-based assessment. The assessed potential is based on available evidence but the physical nature and extent of any archaeological resource surviving within the site cannot be confirmed without detailed information on the below ground deposits or results of on-site fieldwork.

Where known heritage assets are identified, the importance of such assets is determined by reference to existing designations where available. For assets where no designation has been assigned, an informed assessment has been made of the likely historic, artistic, or archaeological importance of that resource based on professional knowledge and judgement.

Adjustments to the classification (Table 2, below) are occasionally made, where appropriate; for some types of finds or assets where there is no consistent value, and the importance may vary. Levels of importance for any such areas are generally assigned on an individual basis, based on professional judgement and advice.

The likely magnitude of the impact of the Proposed Development works is determined by identifying the level of change from the Proposed Development upon the 'baseline' conditions of the Site and the heritage resource identified in the assessment. This effect can be either Adverse (negative), Beneficial (positive) or Neutral. The criteria for assessing the magnitude of impact are set out in Table 2 below.

His work was mainly tender studies of young boys or naturalistic animalsculptures. Later he turned to portrait sculpture, making bronzes of the heads of Benjamin Britten and Peter Pears. Ehrlich's work is represented in several galleries, including the Tate. There was a majorexhibition of his work at the Bruton Galley in 1978 that included the maquette and preparatory studies for Pax. Siefried Bettmann (1863-1951), who commissioned the sculpture, was a German born cyclemanufacturer who was mayor of Coventry at the outbreak of the first World War. Gibbet Hill Farmhouse originated in the 17th century, and some fabric of this date survives. Gibbet Hill Farmhouse originated in the 17th century, and some fabric of this date survives, giving anidea of the plan of the earliest house, and its broad form: a two-room plan with a central stack, whichwas recorded in 1983, but later removed. The house was probably of a single storey and attic, with agable wall with attic window surviving within the first floor of the 18th century extension at the northend showing the original height of the stone-built house. The west wall of the 17th century house, withanother stone mullioned window survives, and at least a portion of the south gable end wall remainsbeneath later render – its lower course is visible just above ground level, and a change in the renderindicates that it is likely to survive across the ground floor. However, beyond the partial survival of thestone walls and the two windows, the only element of the 17th century house to survive a portion ofoctagonal newel post to the stair at the west side, though the rest of the timberwork has been replaced. From the surviving and much altered 17th century fabric, it is not possible to ascertain whichwas the entrance front; the existing doorways in the west elevation are significantly later and unlikelyto mark original openings, and the extension of the building, in at least two phases, to the east, hasaltered or removed so much of the former east elevation that it is not possible to discern anything of the 17th century form. At Gibbet Hill Farmhouse, the surviving parts of the 17th century building do not form a substantial part of the existing building, and it lacks the more significant fabric, such as the removed stack, andmost importantly, any of the 17th century roof structure, which would form one of the most significant and diagnostic parts of a building of this date. The 18th century phase of the house is no more legible now, though it is clear that the upper floor ofthe 17th century house was rebuilt in brick and raised in height, which is evident from the fabric. Thenorthern extension also appears to date from this period, but there is little aside from the shell of thestructure which offers any interest. The simple roof has no trusses, and the visible structure amountsto only two purlins. The other 18th century additions to the building, shown on the tithe map, havebeen entirely replaced by the later extension and remodelling of the house, which research submittedby the owner's representatives has shown was carried out in the mid-19th century. This remodellingwas extensive, involving the addition of new wings to the rear, new windows in new, segmental archedopenings (with the exception of the two retained stone mullioned 17th century windows), and internal refurbishment, including the replacement of almost all visible joinery. A new roof was builtover the eastern range and the new southern elevation, hipped at both ends, to unify the structure, and this new entrance front was partly rendered to hide the patchwork of 17th century stone wall,18th century brick and some new 19th century brick which formed the left-hand bay. Although anattempt was made to create a symmetrical elevation, which would be expected at this date, the factthat the 17th century house was set on ground rather lower than the later additions means that theleft window is set considerably lower in the elevation, and there is no upper window to this bay. This, together with the partial rendering, means that the elevation lacks the harmony of a fully-symmetricaldesign. Internally, the steep, three-stepped change in floor height between the earlier and later parts, and the necessity of creating an off-centre stair resulted in a layout and circulation which does nothave the coherence expected from a house of the mid-19th century. Some of the surviving finishesdate from the 19th century, including two fireplaces with round-arched grates and timber surrounds, and two windows with wide architraves and shallow-fielded panelling. All of these are relativelymodest, pattern-book examples, without any particular interest. The rest of the interior is plain and institutional in character. Since the 1960s, the house has been further altered internally, to change itfrom residential to academic use: the stack has been removed from the 17th century range; there is evidence that the timber casement windows were replaced and some secondary double glazingintroduced in the 1980s; and all the



internal doors have been replaced. Overall, although Gibbet Hill Farmhouse retains some interesting 17th century fabric, this is not ofsufficient significance to meet the bar for listing, and the later phases have obscured, rather than illuminated, the evolution from the early house, through the 18th century and 19th century, to the present building. The resulting building falls short of the level of special interest needed to merit listingin the national context, though it is certainly of local significance. The agricultural buildings associated with the farmhouse are later in date than the original foundation of the house. The owners' representatives dispute the date of the buildings set out in the consultation report, and suggest that they must date from after the time of the tithe map (1843), as only one blockof buildings is shown in this location on that map. However, evidence of the fabric of the formerthreshing barn, in the form of its roof joinery, suggests a date no later than the late 18th century orearly 19th century, and there is a building shown in this approximate location on the map. The owners' representatives own report discusses the accuracy of this map with reference to the house, which isshown in a different position on the tithe map from that which it in fact occupies, but there they are content that it shows the same building. The same is also likely to be true for the barn, which occupies he same position relative to the house as shown on the tithe map, albeit again at a different orientation. As tithe maps were compiled primarily to demonstrate landholding, and not to depictbuildings, they frequently show ranges which vary from reality in proportion and precise position, but are nevertheless a good indicator of the presence of a building of roughly that size in that location. Theremainder of the buildings cannot be more closely identified with those on the tithe map, though theymight be incorporated into the evolved group which now exists. It is likely, therefore, that the barnwas built in the later 18th century or early 19th century, with the other agricultural buildings following around the mid-century; certainly the footprint of the buildings as they exist today coincides with thatshown on the first edition Ordnance Survey map of 1889, with the exception of a few obviouslymodern additions. The owners' representatives quote a valuation for Lord Leigh, dated 1871, whichrefers to the agricultural buildings as: "barn, cattle shed, granary and wagon hovel, brick built andtiled", and state that those functions are no longer discernible within the existing collection ofbuildings. However, the barn, cattle shed and granary are all identifiable: the barn, with its projectingporch and opposing double door openings, both now partially infilled and altered, is readily evident; the granary is recognisable by the diamond-pattern ventilators to the north-east elevation; and thelong building with wide openings to the south-west appears to be the former cattle shed. The barn is the oldest of the buildings on the site, and falls into the 1750-1840 date range where they merit listingif substantially complete. The barn retains its large, pegged, queenpost roof trusses, but the rest of the roof has been quite extensively altered. The rear threshing opening has been closed, with stripglazing to the top and modern up-and-over door below; other associated structural changes have beenmade to the opening necessitating the building of new brick piers supporting the tie beams. The double doorway in the porch to the front has been altered too, with new openings created. The endwalls have been opened to the adjoining buildings. Despite it's relatively earlier date, and the fact thatits original function is still legible, the building has been too altered to merit listing. The remainder of the buildings date from various phases around the middle of the 19th century, wherethere is greater selectivity; the relationships between their fabric are complex and apart from the useof bull-nose bricks for corners and openings, they do not demonstrate any overt quality in architecturalstyle. Although they retain some historic features, such as parts of their roof structures, they have allbeen significantly altered in the 20th century and 21st century. There have been various later horizontal and vertical partitions; roof lights have been inserted; new windows and new openings havebeen inserted; and various accretions have been added. Their grouping, enclosing an irregularlyshapedcourtyard which is broken into by one projecting range, does not show any innovation in itsplanning, and more closely resembles organic growth. History South Winds was built in 1965-6 to the designs of Robert Harvey of Yorke, Harper and Harvey...RobertHarvey was born in Coventry in 1919 and studied architecture at the Birmingham School of Art, thesource of many modern architects in the inter-war period, and one which encouraged a strong interestin the work of Frank Lloyd Wright then and later. Harvey is the most distinguished of a smallidiosyncratic group of Birmingham-trained architects who were fascinated by the work of Frank LloydWright before it became fashionable. Harvey corresponded with Wright during the war. In 1950 hejoined the office of J. Brian Cooper, whence he was given a day off work that year to hear Wrightspeak at the Architectural Association in London. After Cooper, he joined the office of LeonardHarper, the father of his



student contemporary and friend Ross Harper, whose house in Solihull isalready listed. In 1951 this practice amalgamated with that of FWB Yorke, father of the notedmodernist architect F R S Yorke, and Harvey took over the latter's Stratford office, specialising inprivate houses while the Birmingham office handled the more commercial work. Harvey found itdifficult to secure planning permission for many of his early houses, especially those around Ilmingtonin the northern Cotswolds. Ultimately though, he designed over fifty houses, mainly in Warwickshire. He talked little about his work and remained a strongly private figure. Several buildings by RobertHarvey have now been designated, including No.114 Kenilworth Road, Coventry (Grade II); Harvey'sown house, Stonecrop, Ilmington, Warwickshire (Grade II*) and Debden Hollow, Barford, Warwickshire (Grade II). No other strictly regional architect of the period has so many houses listed -an indication of his skill and the quality of his designs. Details MATERIALS: The construction is of teak, concrete and glass set on a groundfloor base of Horntonstone, left roughly hewed. The first floor is carried on a smooth concrete slab with deep coffering, formed from a fibre-glass mould.PLAN: the lower storey is divided into two sections, housing a swimming pool at west and theentrance hall to the east, which also serves as a games room. Between these is a garage space. Acurved staircase leads up to the principal accommodation at first floor level. This has livingaccommodation at the east side and bedrooms to the west, which lead off from a northern bedroomcorridor. SUMMARY OF BUILDING: 3B Series No.1, a welded steel sculpture of 1968 by Bernard Schottlander, issited in the courtyard in front of the Rootes Residential Building at the University of Warwick, Coventry.REASONS FOR DESIGNATION: the welded steel sculpture 3B Series No.1, of 1968 by BernardSchottlander, standing outside the Rootes Building at the University of Warwick, merits listing at Gradell for the following principal reasons:* Artistic interest: scale, colour and geometric shapes are exploited to create a striking and playfulpiece of outdoor sculpture;* Historic interest: an important work of the noted sculptor Bernard Schottlander, commissioned by the University of Warwick, a longstanding patron of the arts, and YRM, a highly regarded modernistarchitect's practice, which is representative of a recurrent theme in his oeuvre of adorning publicplaces, commercial and educational buildings with his art.HISTORYThe period after 1945 saw a shift from commemorative sculpture and architectural enrichment to theidea of public sculpture as a primarily aesthetic contribution to the public realm. Sculpture wascommissioned for new housing, schools, universities and civic set pieces, with the counties of Hertfordshire, London and Leicestershire and the new towns leading the way in public patronage. Thus public sculpture could be an emblem of civic renewal and social progress. By the late C20however, patronage was more diverse and included corporate commissions and Arts Council-fundedcommunity art. The ideology of enhancing the public realm through art continued, but with divergentmeans and motivation. Visual languages ranged from the abstraction of Victor Pasmore and Phillip King to the figurative approach of Elisabeth Frink and Peter Laszlo Peri, via those such as Lynn Chadwick and BarbaraHepworth who bridged the abstract / representational divide. A variation of thesculpture, entitled 3B Series No.2 (c1968) no longer exists, but a model of the sculpture is held in the collection of Leeds City Art Gallery. They were meant to be viewed into the round and from differentlevels and angles. Bernard Schottlander (1924-99) was born in Mainz, Germany into a Jewish family of art enthusiasts. He fled Nazi Germany in 1939, arriving at Leeds where he worked in a factory as a welder whilstattending evening classes in sculpture at the Leeds College of Art. After war service, Schottlanderbecame a British citizen in 1946. Subsequently he received a grant to study sculpture at the Anglo-French Centre in St John's Wood, London, followed by a course in Industrial Design at the LondonCounty Council's Central School of Arts and Crafts. In 1963 Schottlander resolved to concentratesolely on sculpture and had his first solo show in 1964 at the Architectural Association in London. A series of commissions forpublic outdoor works followed, combining his expertise as maker, industrial designer and sculptor.DETAILS3B Series No.1, a welded steel sculpture of 1968 by Bernard Schottlander, is sited in the courtyard infront of the Rootes Residential Building at the University of Warwick, Coventry. This geometrical sculpture of welded mild steel is painted a bright red and is approximately 2.6m highand 4.8m wide and 2.5m deep. Kenilworth Road has been described as the finest approach to any city in the British Isles. It wasdesignated a Conservation Area in December 1968 and extends from the city boundary south of Gibbet Hill Road in a north-easterly direction for approximately 4.8 km (3 miles). The Conservation Area lies astride the Kenilworth Road and is defined by the adjoining tree belts andresidential properties. The wooded area consists of a strip of land approximately 30m wide on bothsides of the road, with wide grass verges and mature deciduous trees which merge into WainbodyWood and Stivichall Common. Behind this tree belt are large detached houses with extensive gardens. To the north of the Fletchampstead/Kenpas Highway (A45) the axial form becomes lessmarked. Nevertheless, Sitvichall Common, the War Memorial Park, The Grove and Top Green allcombine to create continuity of a predominantly mature landscape environment. In addition to the Kenilworth Road axis, several adjoining areas of similar character have been included within the Conservation Area.i)Cryfield Grange Road and Stoneleigh Road/Gibbet Hill Road. These two areas comprise expensivehouses in large mature gardens.ii)Canley Ford. This is a narrow ancient route through Stivichall Common and across Canley brookwhich includes mature hedges, trees, spinneys and earth banks on either side of the lane.iii)Coat of Arms Bridge Road and Stivichall Hamlet. This lies to the east of Kenilworth Road and contains several old cottages, an animal pound and an early railway bridge. Stivichall Commonextends as far as the hamlet. Extensions to the Conservation Area boundaries were made in 1978 to include the War Memorial Park, west side of Davenport Road and King Henry VIII School. Historical BackgroundAll the lands which now comprise the Conservation Area originally formed part of the Stoneleighfoundation of 1154. It is thought that when the Abbey was first founded the monks settled at Cryfieldimmediately to the west of the present-day Kenilworth Road. During the Dissolution of the Monasteries by Henry VIII, Stoneleigh Abbey was one of the first to go. A road to Kenilworth from Coventry was first mentioned in 1313; it followed a narrow belt of commonland along the north and west of Stivichall Parish. It is thought that Kenilworth Road was once part of the old cloth trade route linking the Cotswolds when Coventry was the cloth capital of the Midlands. The road was turnpiked in 1775 and an avenue of oak trees, three rows deep, was planted in theeighteenth century. The present line of Kenilworth Road turns sharply near Earlsdon Avenue South. It is considered thatthe track once went straight on across Stivichall Common and followed the present route of thefootpath to the rear of Morningside into Dalton Road, across the end of Spencer Park and GrosvenorRoad to the end of Queen Victoria Road. Within the woodland of Kenilworth Road is a 7 metre widethof grass-grown roadway with ditches still discernible in parts. This is flanked on one side by brokenstretches of sandstone blocks over which the footpath to Earlsdon Avenue South now runs. During the eighteenth century Kenilworth Road was a haunt of highwaymen and footpads, and severalincidents are recorded. However, the road was never really busy though regular coaches operated. Stivichall's Toll Gate House, located opposite The Grove, was built in 1812 at the point where aweighing machine was erected to control weights and dues. The building was demolished in 1964. Before Albany Road was constructed in 1868 Kenilworth Road was the only vehicular entrance to Earlsdon. A five barred gate prevented cattle wandering from the common into Earlsdon. No toll waslevied at this gate but an old man used to open the gate for travellers and thus added to his income. Near where this gate stood, along the common, is the site of a large quarry from where stone forbuilding St. Thomas's Church (now demolished), Albany Road, was hewn and given to Lord Leigh. It was in 1765 when Gibbet Hill received its name. Thomas Edwards, a local farmer, and two friendswere returning home after midnight from Coventry market. They were attacked in the fields nearWhoberley House some 300 yards from the turnpike road leading to Allesley by Edward Drury and Robert Leslie, both private soldiers, and Moses Baker, a ribbon weaver; they were disguised andarmed with pistols. Edwards was sober and resisted



strongly but received severe head wounds. Thetwo friends were too intoxicated to resist and were left insensible on the ground. They were robbedof three guineas and eleven shillings in silver. Edwards died three days later. The three criminalswere soon apprehended and subsequently convicted at Warwick. They were hanged on April 17th'the bodies to be enclosed by chains and suspended on a gibbet, at Stoneleigh Common'. The gibbet, with the remains of the criminals upon it, is said to have existed for about 50 years. The first record of the Animal Pound in Coat of Arms Bridge Road was in 1663. It stands, west of thebridge on Stivichall Common where freemen of the city had grazing rights until 1881, it was given to the City Council for permanent preservation in 1932 by Major C. H. Gregory-Hood. It had a sandstonefloor, four stone walls and a gate. It has been altered and repaired over the centuries as shown bythe variety of materials in the walls. It was restored in 1972 by the Coventry Civic Amenity Society. Stivichall Hamlet comprises a disused smithy and three cottages, the oldest of which, west of the bridge, is an early seventeenth century timber framed whitewashed building having a tiled roof andhipped gables. It is listed as Grade II. Coat of Arms Bridge was built in 1842 to take the Coventry-Leamington railway line. The coat of arms belong to the Gregory family, owners of the Manor of Stivichall for more than 400 years. The bridge is built in red sandstone and is listed as Grade II. Tothe east of the bridge is Smithy Cottage which is brick built and probably of late 17th century origin. Part of Stivichall Common extends as far as where Top Green and Kin Henry VIII School are locatedtoday. This land was enclosed in 1883 but indicates the previous extent of Stivichall. The school islisted as Grade II. It was built on its present site in 1885 by Edward Burgess and enlarged in 1889and 1936. It was restored in 1950 after wartime bomb damage. It is built in the Tudor style in redbrick, stone dressings and tiled roof. Ivy Farm Lane is narrow and winding and characterised by sporadic verges and enclosing hedges, trees and walls. Cannocks Lane has now been closed at its eastern end, but retains some overgrownbanks which contribute to its rural character. Shultern Lane is narrow, winding and enclosed byhedges. The lane has now been closed to motor vehicles. Several of the buildings along Ivy Farm Lane are listed as being



of special architectural or historicinterest: Ivy Farmhouse is a timber framed building of the 16th or 17th century with stone plinth, red bricknoggin and tiled roof. The mound has the form and characteristic position of a Bronze Age barrow. 16th-century and later documents record this location as Mill Hill Field, the mound may thus represent the site of a medieval windmill, the builder of which may well have exploited an existing prehistoric mound as a suitable platform for the structure. Brickyard Plantation was created in the 19th century at the site of an exhausted quarry and clay pit, but it is still possible to imagine how the mound and the windmill would have dominated the landscape from all directions before the wood grew up.

There is the potential for Iron Age activity associated with this settlement to have extended into the Site. Evidence for this activity may be represented by infilled ditch or pit features, find scatters or evidence of utilisation of the Site for agricultural purposes. Due to the potential high status of the settlement, remains of this date could be of regional significance.

The south-western boundary of the Site could comprise an 'important' hedgerow under the criteria set out in Hedgerows Regulations (1997, Appendix 1). An emphasis on retention is normally desirable, whilst elements of removal, such as to facilitate access and circulation, are normally acceptable in heritage terms.

It is anticipated that the south-western hedgerow will be retained as part of the proposed development. It is anticipated that should archaeological remains survive within the Site they are likely to be of local to regional significance. It is considered that this Assessment provides sufficient information to inform the decision-making process required for the forthcoming outline planning application, and accords with local and national planning policy. 
